PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND TUNNEL

Speech Made By Alexander Martin, M. P. For Queen's in The Dominion House of Commons In Moving For Papers And Correspondence.

(Continued.)
(From Hansard.)
The hon. gentleman—
Referring to a speech delivered by Sir John Macdonald—
—tells us that the people of Saskatchewan river have no wrongs! They have been denied their just rights and now they are slandered by the same men whose unjust course drove them to the unfortunate proceedings they have adopted since. I say they have been treated by this government with an indifference amounting to undisguised contempt, that they have been goaded into the unfortunate course they have pursued and if this rebellion is a crime, I say it weighs as much upon the men who, by their conduct caused the rebellion as upon those who engaged in it.

This because for years and years the government have closed their ears not to hear the complaints, because they have closed their eyes not to see the wrong, because they have acted like the ostrich which buries its head in the sand not to see the danger, this is the reason that we have had an uprising on the Saskatchewan—
Six long years of constant petitioning—
Well, we have been petitioning for thirty-five long years, but six years then was a very long time.
Six long years of constant petitioning had failed to secure justice for these people, but the bullets of Duck lake immediately set the government in motion and immediately brought them to terms. . . . As soon as they took up their old rusty muskets they brought the government to their knees!

I can understand why these people goaded as they were by this systematic ignoring of their claims at last resorted to a most unfortunate course. Men have rebelled time and again for less just cause than these people had.
For six long years the people of the Northwest have been petitioning for their rights; for six long years they have used every constitutional means which the law could place at their disposal in order to get justice. They sent petitions; they met in assemblies; they sent delegations. The petitions remained unanswered; the resolutions adopted in their meetings were ignored.
The delegations were received most courteously—
That is what happened to a delegation from my province not long ago.

The delegations were received most courteously, with sweet smiles and sweeter words, which were put down in writing, but were forgotten as soon as the delegates had turned their backs for home.
That is what happened in regard to Prince Edward Island, a delegation came up here, had a most cordial reception, but the promises which were made to them were forgotten as soon as the delegates had turned their back for home just the same as the premier said had been done in regard to delegations from Saskatchewan. He also gave them a few sweet words.

All these years they had been petitioning and petitioning, begging and begging, knocking and knocking at the door, never lifted a finger to come to their rescue.
Mr. Laurier concluded his impassioned address with these words:
This, I say, and I say it coming from a province where, less than fifty years ago, every man of the race to which I belong was a rebel, and where to-day every man of that race is a true and loyal subject. . . . I say, give these men justice, give them their rights, treat them as for the people of Lower Canada, and by and by throughout these territories you will have contentment, peace and harmony, where to-day discord, hatred and war are ruining the land.

The following year Mr. Laurier, when indicating the government for the execution of Hell used the memorable exclamation: Too late! Too late! Too late!
It is too late! I am afraid the time will come when it will be too late in Prince Edward Island. They will never adopt the extreme measures that were taken in Saskatchewan, they are too loyal for that, but nevertheless they have been previously neglected. The grievances of the white, non-Boer population of

the Transvaal were unredressed resulting in the Jameson raid, the Boer war and the loss of thousands of lives and millions of dollars. I wish to take this opportunity of bringing these facts to the House to remind the premier that in days long ago when his heart was warm towards the halfbreeds of Saskatchewan he gave utterance to the words which I have just quoted.
Now, I propose to come down to something more practical. I have given the opinions of our public men, of Sir John Macdonald, of our worthy premier and of D'Arcy McGee. If there is any question in regard to the expense of this tunnel I will call the attention of the House to the opinion of such an eminent authority as Sir Douglas Fox. Sir Douglas Fox, a few years ago, made the estimate that the tunnel could be built for \$10,000,000. He has written a letter since to the Rev. A. E. Burke, a clergyman who is well known all over Canada, on the subject of the cost of the tunnel. It is as follows:

Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.
Dear Mr. Burke,—I am in receipt of yours of the 28th ultimo. Since I reported on the proposed tunnel many devices have been introduced for reducing cost and I quite hope, if the matter were again formally submitted to us, we might be able to suggest modes of construction which would considerably reduce cost of the proposed tunnel between the mainland and the island.

Why was not Sir Douglas Fox again consulted?
It would not be a very great undertaking. Sir Douglas Fox is one of the most practical engineers and one who has had large experience in the building of tunnels. If the department of railways and canals had applied to Sir Douglas Fox, a man who knows something about tunnels, they would likely have to-day a lower estimate of the cost of the work. But, the government have deferred action. They have done nothing to test the feasibility of the tunnel between my province and the mainland. The hon. Minister of Finance (Mr. Fielding) at the end of last session, promised us that the surveys would be completed. I do not think that anything has been done. There has been no report that I know of and nothing has been done. Why? Is the promise which the premier made to us in 1891 to remain unfulfilled? This is vital to the connection between Prince Edward Island and the mainland has been a matter of interest to me and to the people of my province for years and years and it is vital to the welfare of my province that it should be accomplished.
At six o'clock, House took recess.

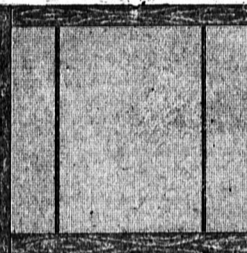
