The contention that our present preferential trade is one-sided, or jug-handled, is somewhat calculated to provoke discontent on the part of Canada toward the Mother Country. Many would be pleased if Britain would impose a duty upon breadstuffs other than those imported from British possessions, but it is clear that the making of a tariff for the United Kingdom is a matter for the British people. We make our own tariff and must permit them a like privilege. We have long willingly offered to the people of the United States the free admission of fish, coal, lumber and farm products into Canada provided they would reciprocate by giving like free admission to our natural products. We do not under the preferential tariff admit British products free of duty or nearly so, though Britain has long given us an entirely free market for all we had to sell. We fail to see that the existing arrangement is one-sided or unfair, or that we ought to claim more at the hands of the British people than we now receive. Nor can we find in the utterance of British public men or of the British press that Britain is at all likely to reverse her long established trade policy by imposing a duty upon breadstuffs. It is worse than idle to cherish hopes that must in the end prove delusive. The question for us to consider is whether the existing preference is to be maintained or repealed, and there has been as yet no loud call for repeal.

Hon. Mr. Fielding in an interview some weeks ago gave a distinct intimation that the existing rates of duty are to be maintained. We are somewhat at a loss as to the object of this deliverance. It will prove disappointing those who had expected a continuous movement "in direction of free trade." It will no doubt do something to reassure those manufacturing industries whose proprietors feared such further reduction of duties as might endanger their position. At the same time it will readily be construed by those asking for higher duties that their wishes cannot be complied with. It is desirable on business grounds that the tariff should be reasonably stable. We therefore understand that the Government in going to the country stand by the tariff as it is, the preferential clauses included, of course, and subject only to such minor changes as experience may demonstrate to be necessary from year to year.

Politics serve to draw away attention from the city lighting job. Nothing can whiten that shady transaction. The Council have placed the city wholly at the mercy of Mr. Waddell and his company for the coming year. They have shut out competition. They have rejected a fair and honest proposal to give the city a good light at fair prices, and compelled our citizens to pay a high rate for a very unsatisfactory light. The renomination of Mr. Alex. Martin as the Conservative candidate for East Queens was made in convention yesterday. This completes the list of standard-bearers for the two ridings of Queens.

## Conservative Demonstration.

When the Conservative party came into power they considered that confederation was on paper only unless communication was established and today from the shores of Cape Breton to the Pacific Coast the people of Canada have a line of inter-oceanic communication, the completion of which is due to the Conservative party. He said that in the course of his remarks it might be his duty to refer to Sir Louis Davies in rather strong terms. He regretted that he should have to refer to him in any way that was unkind but he considered him one of the greatest sinners of them all, one who does not deserve the name of Liberal, but of obstructionist. He then referred to Sir Louis' attitude in connection with the building of the railroad. He contended that the people of Canada only have to read history to find out that his party had grappled with the great questions of the day in a statesmanlike manner. The people of Canada are unanimous and of one opinion that prosperity is rife, but the Conservative party denies the statement made that it is due to Liberal rule. The advance of the day is due to the breaking down of the obstruction made by the Liberal party to the measures brought forth by the Liberal-Conservative Party of Canada. Passing on he defined Mr. Fielding's attitude in the province of Nova Scotia upon Confederation and claimed that when he returned from England he compelled Mr. Fielding to abandon his policy. Everything that had added to the prosperity of Canada had not been achieved by the Liberals and he challenged those who dissented from his views to place their fingers upon one single measure initiated by the Liberal party that had contributed to the welfare of Canada. It ought to be an easy matter to arrive at the conclusion which party should merit the support of the electorate. There was not an intelligent man present who when he found that his neighbor was not reliable but would distrust him and give him the cold shoulder. The electorate of Canada know too well how the Liberal Government of to-day gained power. He had challenged the members of the administration to show one single pledge that they had redeemed and he repeated the same challenge today. He could give evidence that would prove that pledges given by the Sir Wilfred Laurier's Government had never been carried out.

Sir Charles then took up the question of preferential trade and charged the present administration with incapacity, mal administration and corruption. (A voice—what about the two cent postage?) Sir Charles—a two cent elector asks about the two cent postage. He claimed

that when the Postmaster General, Mr. Mulock, instructed the officials to steal stamps and put them on the letters contrary to law he was committing a grave offence and he contended that when Mr. Henneker-Heaton move for penny postage at the Postal Congress he originated the idea of a penny rate throughout the Empire. The adoption of the two cent rate for Canada was an afterthought which the Government were compelled by the Conservative press to take up. Continuing Sir Charles referred to the Crow's Nest Pass railway which would connect the mineral belt of Rossland with the prairie country, contending that the subsidy in money and lands was very excessive. The Senate which the Liberal Government wanted to abolish, thwarted the scheme. He then condemned the management of the Yukon, claiming that the officials were totally unfit for the positions held by them. For 45 years he had been looking for something that would give permanency and solidity to the British Empire. All other countries that have colonies treat them with favor. Sir Wilfred Laurier visited the Province of Ontario and expressed himself as approving of Preferential Trade and his speech is to be found to-day in the Toronto Globe. He afterwards pledged himself to secure a commission. Later on he went to England and attended the Diamond Jubilee. He was met in England by the Duke of Devonshire who made a speech stating that England who stood alone must look to her colonies for food supply. Sir Wilfred Laurier although bound by pledges, turned his back upon Preferential Trade and denounced it, claiming that protection would be a curse to Canada and England as well. This action, Sir Charles characterized as a base betrayal. Down to the present hour Sir Wilfred Laurier had never given a reason for his change of front. The course he is pursuing of giving an advantage to England with out getting anything in return is the most effectual way of killing Preferential Trade Sir Charles claimed that at the Congress of the Chambers of Commerce he had received the hearty support of Lord Strathcona and a majority of the members of the Conference. The Minister of Finance had condemned the policy as a bumbag, altho' the different Boards of Trade had recommended it. As old as he was he expected to see Preferential Trade the policy of the Empire. Notwithstanding England's strength on land and on sea there is a fear of her food supply. He then referred to the abandoning of the policy of Unrestricted Reciprocity and claimed that the only good feature in it was the fact that the Liberal party were compelled to abandon the advocacy of 18 years. He closed his speech by predicting a glorious victory in the next general election. He urged the electorate to elect Mr. Stewart as an addition to the party's coming large majority. He hoped to return at no distant date to exchange congratulations.

At the conclusion of his speech the place was very warm and Sir Charles left the platform.
