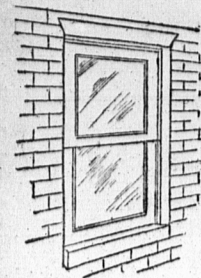

I had postponed the evil day, but I was not quite happy. I had not yet become hardened in deceitful ways.

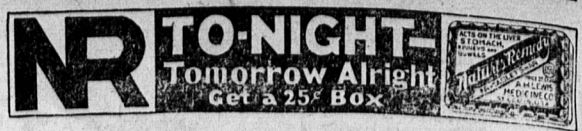

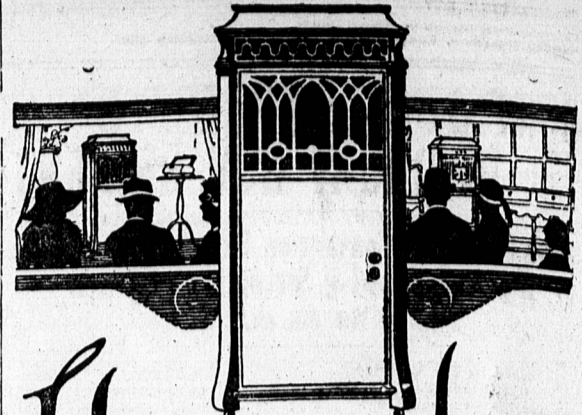
