Colonel Ralston Probes McNoughton Statements in the House of Commons

Examination by Col. J. L. Ralston, former Minister of National Defense, and others, of statements made by the House of Commons by General A. G. L. McNoughton, Minister of National Defense, on the subject of overseas reinforcements from the Hansard official report, Nov. 23.

Mr. Graydon: I take it that we are to be confined as much as possible to questioning the Minister of National Defense. Out of deference to a great Canadian I think I should indicate to Your Honour the information that occurred to me that I should make way for the hon. gentleman who represents the constituency of Prince in Prince Edward Island. I think this deference is due him in view of the importance of the matter and in view of the fact that at this time party lines and all divisions of opinion in the House of Commons are down. Therefore I am ready to give way to the hon. member for Prince.

Mr. Ralston: There is quite a bit of information that General McNoughton has given, and it seemed to me that it might be regarded as bordering on the territory of security. As I have been listening to the hon. member, I think that possibly the way to deal with any matters in connection with the information desired, if there is to be a secret session, is to deal with this matter, to decide there and then—

Mr. Ralston: I am sorry, I have not yet made up my mind, but I am sure that the hon. member would be more useful to the house and to the public if any information which is desired and which borders on the line of security could be elicited from General McNoughton with the galleries clear, and then such information could be made public would be published.

"The Humble Member For Prince" I am obliged to my hon. friend for suggesting that I should be given the right of way, but I am not here as the public interrogator of this house. I am the humble member for Prince, and I know a little about the things that are going on in this house.

Some hon. members: Oh, oh. Mr. Ralston: (York-Sunbury): You will have to eat crow like the rest.

Mr. Ralston: I will have to ask the minister to take the responsibility for warning us if there is any matter of security connected with the questions I ask. There are two things that I am concerned about. I have not a copy of his statement. I found it a little difficult to hear him, I was sorry that I was following that he proposed to maintain the size of the army in view of the fact that he has mentioned six thousand men.

Mr. Ralston: (York-Sunbury): Why not? Mr. McNoughton: The reason is that to be intelligible it would have to be broken down in such a way as to disclose the estimate in other forms of activity. Since the period is not a very long one it might give indication of intention.

Answer Challenged Mr. Ralston: I wonder if that is quite the situation? I understand that when one is estimating casualties one estimates so many weeks or months of intense activity, so many months normal and so many months quiet. I am not talking about that. I am talking about the pool, and on the basis of a pool generally the estimate is on so many months or weeks of intense activity. I do not think there is any possibility of giving any information to the enemy if we estimate intense activity. Without giving the numbers of the pool, how many weeks of intense activity would you feel that you should provide for by way of a pool in Italy? I do not think the distinction you make applies to pools; I

Mr. Ralston: (York-Sunbury): The staff have prepared a most complete table which is made up much in the form of the hon. member for Prince has indicated. This shows what we have planned for many occasions in calculating the number of troops to be sent to the front of you. Then your safety would be assured according to Mr. Ralston: But you estimate for how long ahead? Mr. McNoughton: It is related to the campaign.

The Overall Pool Mr. Ralston: With regard to the overall pool in the United Kingdom, is not the size of that pool being a matter of security? I am not dividing it into battle areas. Mr. McNoughton: The reserves in the United Kingdom have to be figured on a different basis from that which would be the case if the troops came from the United Kingdom. We have to allow for the time of transporting troops across the Atlantic, and we must provide cushions against that. It is not the distance, it is the time taken to get our troops from this country into the forward area that counts. All those factors have to be taken into account.

Figures "Unstable" Mr. McNoughton: But, from the table they could draw general conclusions which could be used outside without using the specific figures. I would like to say also that these figures are unstable, if I can use that word, in that they are susceptible to many minor factors that enter into the matter from day to day.
