WHEAT EXPORT MARK PASSEL

Clearance For Week Ending Sept 23rd Exceeds Volume In Any Week During Entire Crop Year 1931 - 1932.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 30.—The export clearances of wheat for the week ending Sept. 23, amounting to 6,654,701 bushels, was the largest so far this crop year, and exceeds the volume of export clearances in any single week during the entire crop year 1931-32, says a statement issued today by Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce.

PREPARATIONS FOR LARGE ENTRY LIST IN FOX EXHIBITION

Widespread Interest In Forthcoming Silver Fox Show. Mr. George A. Callbeck, Appointed Judge At Meeting Of Directors Last Evening.

A meeting of the Directors of the Silver Fox Exhibitors Association was held last evening in the Provincial Building and a large amount of business in connection with the Silver Fox Show which will be held at Charlottetown, November, 2nd, 3rd and 4th, was completed. The committee on finances reported that \$1,000 had been voted towards the prize list by the Canadian National Fox Breeders Association. Indications are for a large exhibit of foxes as reports from all parts of the Province are to that effect.

Amount Of C.N.R. Saving Likely To Surprise Public When Budget Disclosed

This Year's Demands Only Half Of Amount Called For Year Ago - No Big Outlays.

(Special) OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—When the public accounts are tabled at the approaching session of Parliament, the economies which have been effected in operation of the Canadian National Railways are likely to be a surprise to many.

Produce As Collection

(Special) GODERICH, Sept. 30.—Members of rural churches of the United Church of Canada may contribute animals, produce or poultry in lieu of cash as their contribution to the missionary and maintenance funds. The plan was approved by Huron County Presbytery in session here, quite a number of ministerial and lay delegates stating their church would be unable to raise their allocation this year.

WOMAN FACES MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE IN N.S.

Four-Year-Old Child Killed When Car Swerves Into Ditch.

(Canadian Press) ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S., Sept. 30.—Mrs. Ethyl Steele White of Memramcook, N. B., today was committed for trial on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Robert Spurr Foster, aged 4, who was killed by her car on September 2. She will be tried at the November session of Supreme Court. Magistrate H. R. McKay granted her application for release on bail of \$2,000.

NEW INDEX OF BETTER TIMES

C. N. Telegraphs Report Increase Of 17 Percent In Messages Carried During August.

(Special to The Guardian) MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 30.—An increase of seventeen percent in messages carried during the last two weeks of August, compared with the first two weeks of the same month is reported by the Canadian National Telegraphs, since telegraph communications are regarded as the "nerve centre of commerce."

Beauharnois Power October 1

(Special to The Guardian) MONTREAL, Sept. 30.—The St. Lawrence, now pressing at the gates into the power house, will begin to turn the great generators of the Beauharnois Light, Heat & Power Co. on Oct. 1. A small switch in the control is ready to dispatch the energy of the St. Lawrence eastward to the Quebec-Ontario boundary for delivery to the Ontario Hydro-Electric commission.

Losing In Trade War

(Special to The Guardian) DUBLIN, Sept. 30.—Reflecting the economic difficulties existing with Britain trade returns for August reveal conditions are growing serious in the Free State. The figures show that while purchases from Britain declined under 30 per cent., sales by the Free State to Britain fell off more than 61 per cent.

Baldwin Replies To Criticism Of Free Traders

Conservative Leader Scores Inconsistency Of Opponents Of Ottawa Agreements.
