THE Guardian had a pleasant call yesterday from Rev. Matthew Smith of Annapolis, N. B. The venerable preacher who is still hale and hearty at ninety years of age, has now been preaching for seventy years. Born in England in 1813 he came to Charlottetown four years later, sailing from Hull, and being ten weeks and three days on the ocean before reaching this port. Here he married a Miss Boyce of Cove Head and entered upon his life work. In 1841 he removed to Annapolis, N. B. where he has since resided, and where Mrs. Smith died some three years ago. Rev. Mr. Smith has spent the past few months on the Island visiting old friends and preaching as occasion offered. Beginning in November last he preached once in New Annan, once in North Carleton, once in Victoria, twice in Hampton and once in Alexandria. The Guardian is pleased to know that his health is still excellent and the winter's cold has apparently no terrors for this veteran of ninety. Rev. Mr. Smith has many friends in New Brunswick and P. E. Island who will be glad to learn of his good health and his activity in the good work of preaching the gospel.
