15 Germans Are Headache to Erie Gov't

BY ALAN MONTGOMERY DUBLIN, March 12 (CP) - Fifteen German naval prisoners of war, who stole a French patrol boat from St. Nazaire and sailed to Kinsale harbor, County Cork, are giving the Erie authorities a headache.

The Germans arrived among a lot of pro-Allied people in Cork and their presence is deeply resented. They are being cared for by the local Red Cross which provides all their food and 20 cigarettes a day—much more than local people can get.

It has not yet been decided what to do with them. The Germans want to be sent to Germany or stay in Erie; and French authorities want them sent back to where they came from with their stolen boat.

Peat Projects In an attempt to make Erie as independent as possible before the war, the Erie Government has launched a 10-year plan to develop peat production by mechanical means—at a cost of 3,250,000 pounds.

Two electricity generating plants, which will consume 280,000 tons of peat and produce approximately 210,000,000 units of electricity a year.

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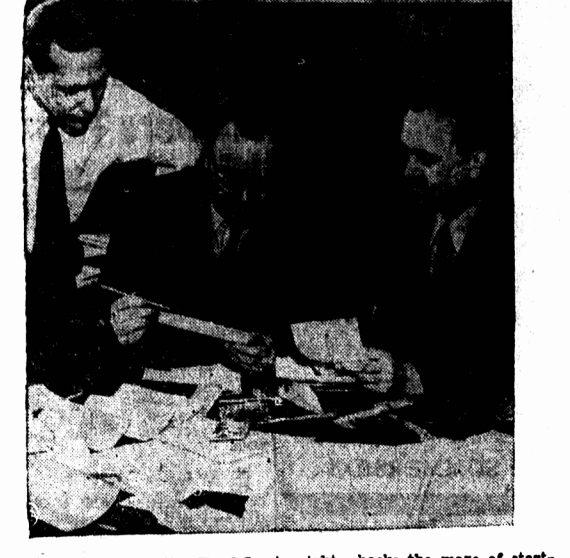
Government Setback Prime Minister de Valera's political party suffered its first setback since it came into power in 1932. In the recent 'minority' general election, when five by-elections were held on the same day, the party lost its first by-election in South County Mayo where the party's candidate was defeated by the Farmer's Party nominee.

Results of the by-elections revealed the strength of the government party was substantially reduced. In the North West Dublin constituency, where Mr. De Valera's party's candidate, Mr. E. J. De Valera was elected, only 28 per cent of the electorate voted—lowest recorded poll in Erie for 25 years.

Allies Top War Secrets Gained by Nazi Spy Ring Operating With Impunity in Sweden

BY NEA FOREIGN SERVICE STOCKHOLM, March 11 (NEA)—The war secrets of the United States, Great Britain, and other Allied countries rolled off like canned goods from a conveyor belt operated by a Nazi spy ring in Sweden during the war.

Among those arrested and expelled in addition to recording for posterity the secrets of the Nazis' greatest espionage center, had performed in the final phase of the war, sundry services for the Allies, particularly for the Danish and Norwegian underground. Now, in reward, he was permitted to stay in Sweden until arrangements could be made for his departure for an overseas country.

Before he left Sweden, in February of this year, Herr X handed his hoard of microfilms over to an NEA representative for publication in U. S. newspapers.

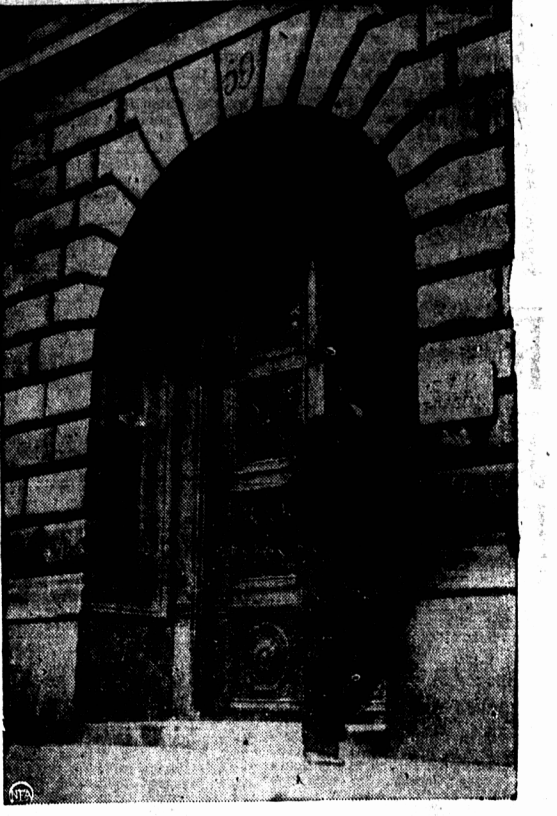

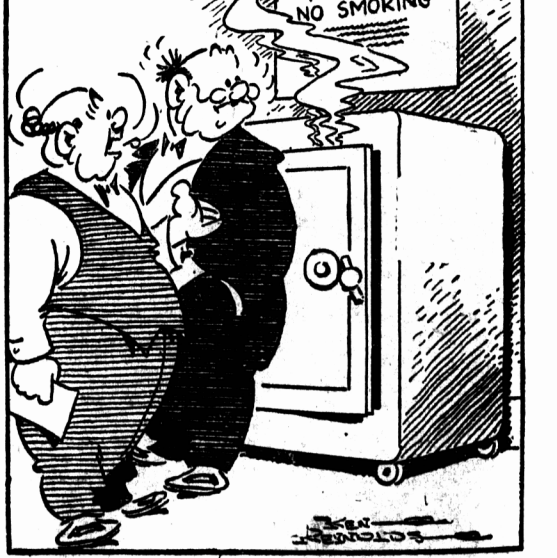
