MANTELL STILL TRUE TO STAGE TRADITIONS.

"The Light of Other Days" a Real Old-fashioned "Thriller" Interest of Plot Never lags.

The coming of that sterling actor, Mr Robert B. Mantell in his new play has created no small degree of interest among a class of theatre-goers to whom seldom catered in these days of degenerate and suggestive drama, i. e., those who prefer to witness a high-class and meritorious romantic play, properly staged and presented by real artists to seize a baby or problem play rendered by actors of interior abilities.

From our exchanges we learn the fact that the same interest displayed here is noticeable elsewhere throughout the country, including New York City.

The following article on this subject is copied from the New York Daily Press of December 1st.

"One by one the heroes of the old school of romantic drama wearily cease to lag on the stage in these days when a perverted public taste has no palate for the robust, but is tickled by the foolery of our Clyde Fiches and when the reigning matinee gods are the Pavershams and Hacketts and Richmans and all that ilk of curled darlings of the degenerate playworld.

"Time was when F. urteenth Street was not down-town and Robert Mantell was in fashion. But these were the palmy days when the stage was not the place to hear social problems discussed or the idle vanities paraded, but a place where irrepressible conflict raged between villainy and virtue and where there was no compromise, once the issue was joined, until the bitter end. Time was when the conscientious actor's breast heaved with honest emotion of which he was not ashamed; when his voice rang unbridled with the passion which, if he is in fashion, he now makes his audience feel by inference. Truly, a change has come over the spirit of art since its quest of strange gods.

"Of all that galaxy of the romantic drama's palmy days, with its clash of sword and its unconquerable hero, its persecuted and abducted maiden and its sneering villain, its scheming dowager and its moated castle, few "stars" are left to us; Even Kyrie Bellew, after a score of years of fealty thereto has forsaken the bravery of doublet and hose and good steel for the modern fancy of society drama. But Robert Mantell is still true to the ancient traditions, and regales us again with the real old thing.

"Mr. Mantell is presenting an old-fashioned "thriller" called "The Light of Other days," suggested, the program says, by one of Keeton Castle's early novels, the workmanship of W. A. Tremaine and Irving Hall, leaves nothing to be desired in the way of brisk action. From the prologue, in which as villainous looking French Revolutionist mob as ever was turned out in the Reign of Terror" does its worst, to the final duel—a slashing fine bit of sword play—the motion and interest of the plot never lags.

"The light of Other Days" gives Mr. Mantell ample scope for the use of a voice whose richness is in no way impoverished, and is valuable in showing how fine an actor he is and how much may be expected of him when opportunity affords."

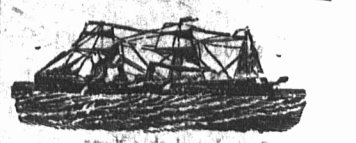

A By-Law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general Civic purposes for the Current Year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D., 1904.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1st., a discount at the rate of 2 1/2% shall be allowed all tax payers who shall on or before the 25th day of July, next, A.
