The brand of hockey put up on the other side, is of course, of that sort which requires something pretty good to outdo it, yet there is hope for the isolated "garden's" representative team to get a pretty good look in in the finals. Chester Gregory, of the New Glasgow, "pro," who, by the way, is a native of this city and an old schoolmate of the writer's, told friends he had seen here compared well with the best work-outs he had seen on the mainland. "There is speed to burn here and," he said, "with proper training there are chances for a crackerjack team." Now, what is the matter with going after that trophy? The P. E. Hockey League, it is understood, are sending in their notification of contest for the trophy to the trustees of the cup this week. This has to be done before February 15th of each year.

DR. NESBITT IS PROBABLY IN U. S.

TORONTO, Ont., Jan 17—Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, wanted in connection with the Farmers' Bank failure, is believed to be in the United States, and if he is, no difficulty is anticipated in bringing him back. If the office with which he is charged is not an extraditable one, it is thought that the American authorities will be willing to deport him as an undesirable immigrant.

Reports last night were continual and persistent that Dr. Nesbitt had been seen at Buffalo and they are true. He was there on Thursday, but left word for his mail to be forwarded to Gavenhurst whether he himself went.

It is admitted that Dr. Nesbitt was heavily indebted to the Farmers' Bank when the negotiations for the Keeley Mine were in progress. This money had been advanced by Travers without security, and to reimburse the bank Nesbitt finally relinquished the stock held by him in the Keeley Mine. From time to time Dr. Nesbitt has secured advances from Travers through the Farmers' Bank to carry him along.

Sensational developments are hourly expected in the case of a former director who is said to be in western Canada. He is wanted on a serious charge and another man who sold considerable stock is also being sought by the police. The crown authorities admit that further action is being taken but are reluctant to give out any definite statements until the warrants have been executed. A second charge will be laid against Dr. Beattie Nesbitt. In an interview this morning Dr. J. Ferguson, one of the four provisional directors who have been summoned said it was the usual thing for provisional directors to get fees.

HAS POPE DISAPPEARED.
SHERBROOKE, Jan 19—No trace has yet been found of the body of W. P. Pope, the missing Bromptonville merchant. Detective McCaskill was on the scene all day and, from what can be learned, is of opinion that the thing is a fake and that Pope has disappeared.

BLAMES "BAD AIR" FOR 1,483 DEATHS.

A Chicago despatch says: The health bureau shows that 1,483 lives were lost in three months, due to "bad air" disease, and blames the surface roofs and elevated line for most of them.

"Time was," says the bulletin, "when the department charged pneumonia almost solely to the hibernating habits of the flat dweller. But from recent investigation the danger from foul and germ laden air must be put on the cards of the surface and elevated roads."

"Indoor conditions are getting better all the time. Thousands now are sleeping every night in bedrooms with wide open windows. They have learned that pure air is life."

"But street cars and elevated trains are as tightly closed and as places for disease as they were five or ten years ago."

"The pneumonia death rate should not be so high. If the cars were kept ventilated there would be a steady decrease in the number of bad air victims."

"Nothing is more important than to keep out of badly ventilated places. If you ever go out of the snow into a hot waiting room jammed with people and with all its windows closed? Get out. Go where the wind can blow the air from around you."

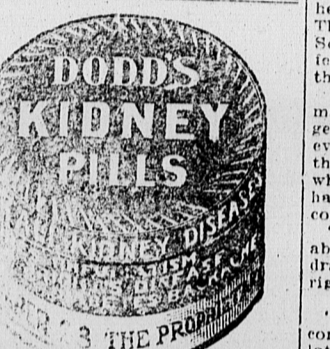
"The next time you go into a place where the air is still and quiet, where no drafts are felt, notice how quickly you become sleepy, yawny, and get a headache. On the other hand, a breeze in summer or winter stimulates you."

"Drafts are invigorating. Lack of drafts is depressing. A cold bath is much healthier than a hot one for the average person. Drafter places are healthier than places without drafts. There is less pneumonia in them. Some one says to chill or wet your feet will give you cold. Keep tab on these points."

"Every time your feet get cold mark it down and see how often you get a 'bad cold.' Do the same every time your feet get wet. Keep the same tab on your colds and see whether you think cold or wet feet has anything to do with 'taking colds.'"

"You will find that your ideas about cold feet, or wet feet, or drafts have been more wrong than right."
