LAST OF ITS TYPE—A Moncton exchange reports the presentation to the New Brunswick Museum of a picture of the battle "Edna M. Smith" which was painted by Albert County, N. B., in 1903, for the late Nelson Smith, of Coverdale, and believed to be the last square-rigged vessel built in New Brunswick if not in Canada. The late Mr. Smith referred to was the father of Hon. Lewis Smith, New Brunswick Minister of Agriculture, and of Mrs. Perry W. Turner of this city. It was Mrs. Turner that the "Edna M. Smith" was called. Mr. Smith was a large ship-builder and many of his vessels were called after different members of his family. Union Prayer Meeting

In St. Paul's Church last evening a very inspiring and well-attended union meeting of the evangelical churches was held, following the lines of the Week of Prayer services of last month. Nearly all the evangelical clergy of the city took part. After the General Confession and the reading of the first lesson by Dr. Legate, Dr. Ramsay led in the recitation of the Apostle's Creed, and the Rev. H. D. Raymond welcomed the visitors to the Church and thanked the members of the choir of other churches who participated. He announced that, as this was not a formal service but a meeting of prayer, he would call for volunteer extemporaneous prayers on the subject of thanksgiving, spiritual awakening, the needs of others, for national and international guidance, and for missions everywhere. In this session of prayer, several members of the congregation and the visiting clergy took part.

The Rev. C. N. Brown then spoke briefly on the subject of persistence in prayer, following the parable contained in the first eight verses of Luke 11, which had been read as the second lesson. He stated that, in the Christian conflict at every point and on every front, it is nowhere more difficult to even hold what we already have than in our prayer life. Of course, we believe in prayer in general, but in our own lives we are not so sure and at times it seems as if God is deaf to our prayers. We are so impatient and anxious for quick results that we do not realize that it is God's way of strengthening us to make us persist in prayer in great earnestness and then suddenly make His presence known in our hearts. "Man ought always to pray and not to faint." We should lean upon Him continually in whole-hearted trust that He is able and willing to give us what is needed. The speaker mentioned the lesson of the mother eagle (Deut. 32) pushing her young ones off the nest, then flying under them and bearing them up, and again dropping from under them and again catching them between her wings. scheduled to start from the Place de la Bastille, fall of which marked the beginning of the French Revolution.

Running pistol battles, meanwhile, broke out near the Madeleine Church between police, Communists and hoodlums at 10:30 p.m.

BARRICADES

Six barricades had been built along the Boulevard des Capucines. Mobs set fire to all the newspaper vending places from the Opera House to the Madeleine, and smashed shop windows.

Just a few minutes before the streets near the Elysee Palace were swept by savage pistol fire. Scores of persons were wounded in that vicinity.

Mobs were hurled back from the President's Palace by gunfire and the vicious club play of police and then surged toward the Boulevard des Capucines.

All wounded were taken to nearby hospitals for emergency treatment. In the nearby Rue Mogador, behind the Opera House, police and rioters, trapped there by officers, fought bitterly.

Another sector also the fighting flared with increased vengeance. The bridgehead barricade near the Place de la Concorde, scene of the fiercest fighting last night, was repeatedly assaulted by the mobs.

Inside the Palace, which was protected by a small army, President Lebrun sought a solution to what he called a "tragic situation."

One man was shot in the stomach, perhaps fatally, during the fighting near the Madeleine Church.

All ground floor windows of the famous department store Trocadero in the Boulevard de la Madeleine were smashed.

Police declared they had withheld their fire, under orders, and that all shots had come from rioters. Fire hydrants were opened and the manifestants deluged by huge geyzers of water.

They seemed to be little inclined to charge the enemy Chamberlain and the focal point of yesterday's disorders.

The withdrawal of Daladier's ministry failed to calm the hot-heads. Battles, more violent than those before, swept the spacious Place de la Concorde this evening as mounted guards, their sabres drawn, charged repeatedly into the surging throngs.

President Lebrun was understood to have prepared a decree by which the Chamberlain would be dismissed and call new elections to still the mobs' ominous cries of "thieves" and "assassins!" directed at the government.

Adding to the seriousness of the crisis were disorders by Royalists in provincial cities—Lille, Nantes and Nancy, where police had to be summoned to subdue the mobs.
