PRIEST ORDAINED.—An interesting and impressive ceremony was performed at the High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday morning, when Mr. Wilbert B. McKenzie of this city was elevated to the holy priesthood, by His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown. Rev. Father Hughes was Master of Ceremonies, Rev. Father Maurice McDonald and Rev. Father McQuaid, First and Second Assistants respectively. Rev. J. J. McDonald preached the sermon for the occasion in which he eloquently decried the responsibilities assumed by the young priest while congratulating him upon the distinction he had won in being called to this high and holy office. Seated in the Sanctuary during the service were Revs. Dr. McLellan, Father Joseph Gallant and Father Porier. The ordained priest is the son of Mrs. John McKenzie, 159 Kent Street and was educated at St. Dunstan's and the Seminary at Halifax.

WELL KNOWN ATHLETE HOME.—Sergeant Colin McNevin, who some years ago made quite a reputation here as a long distance runner, was among the 225 soldiers who arrived home on Friday night. Colin's numerous friends will be delighted to see him again and to know that he has come through the great world conflict safely and is feeling in the best of health. He enlisted in Halifax in 1915 when a student at Dalhousie, joining the A. M. C. He soon afterwards joined the 40th Battalion at Valcartier and served 18 months with them in France, taking part in all the principal fighting since August. It is interesting to know that Sergeant McNevin as well as doing a good share of fighting upheld well the reputation of himself and his native province in athletics since leaving here. Where at Valcartier he won the all round championship of the whole camp, winning in all the runs from a half mile to five miles. In England in 1917 he won the mile and half mile championship of the whole Aldershot area and in 1918 was half mile champion for the Second Division. Sergt. McNevin belongs to DeSable. He intends returning to Dalhousie later to resume his studies.

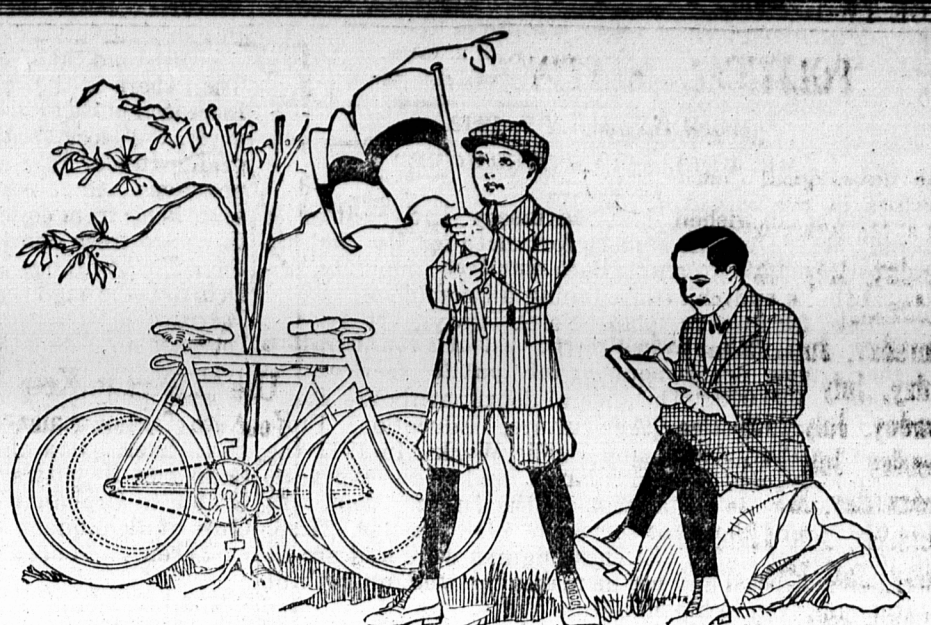
PERSONALS Mr. Louis Mullen of this city, who has been visiting in New York, since his return from overseas, returned home Saturday night.

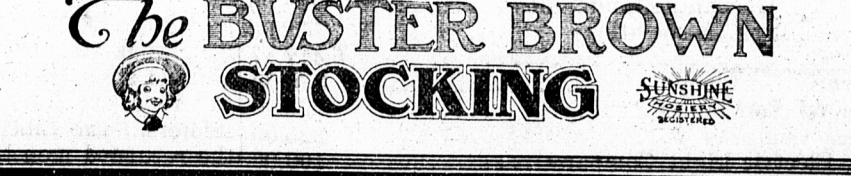
