## HEIRESS TO ESTATE IN THE ANTIPODES.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Oct. 23.—Mrs. Mark Mondia, wife of an employe of one of the local power companies, and in humble circumstances, is arranging to sell her little home in Seventh St. and sail for Australia, where, with Mrs. Sarah Louise Marshall, she will prove her claim to an estate of £60,000,000.

Mrs. Mondia has been in correspondence with Mrs. Marshall, her sister, for several months, and in that time has received many letters from her, but the last one arriving a few days ago contained the first intimation as to the value of the estate. Heretofore the letters have been very vague as to the value of the property to which she was heir, and contained only details as to family connections and references to the relationship of the two women, and their ancestors.

It appears from facts that have been established, Col. F. W. who has charge of the matter for Mrs. Mondia, that one Edward William Jennings, Mrs. Mondia's grandfather, living in England, had a son who married against his father's wishes and was disinherited. This was in 1822. No one seems to know where he went except that he came to Canada. This son was Edward William Jennings, and was the only heir to his father's estate.

On his death bed, according to the story told by Mrs. Mondia, the father related, and commissioned a barrister in England to search for the son, and, if alive, turn the estate over to him. Mrs. Mondia was a Miss Jennings, and she has reason to believe that she is the daughter of this heir. Her sister, Mrs. Marshall, went to Australia a number of years ago. Mrs. Mondia was 12 years old when her father disappeared, and she does not know where he went. The family first settled in Toronto, then went to Hamilton, and ultimately came to this city.

These facts, so Mrs. Mondia says, have all been established by records which she now possesses, and as soon as she can dispose of her little home she will go to Australia, where she will join her sister, who, it is said in the last letter, is seriously ill, and may not recover, and then go to England and lay claim to the vast estate, most of which, it has been learned by Mr. Hill, is in good securities.

## MR. BRODERICK COMING TO CANADA.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—John Joyce Broderick, vice consul general of the British Empire at this port, was the guest of honor at the reception of the Canadian Society held this evening at Delmonico's. Mr. Broderick has been promoted to the post of consul at Amsterdam.

Rev. Dr. Charles A. Eaton, president of the society, conveyed to the guest the sentiments of the assembled Canadians, who have always found in the general Irishman, a sympathetic representative of the mother country.

In a short address, Mr. Broderick announced his intention of visiting Canada before leaving America for his new post.

## GENERAL BOOTH SAILS FOR AMERICA

LONDON, Oct. 21.—Hundreds of members of the Salvation Army, including all of the high officers of the organization in London and vicinity joined today in a great farewell demonstration in honor of General Bramwell Booth, the eldest son and successor of the late General William Booth. The occasion of the demonstration was the departure of General Booth from Southampton to begin his first tour of American since he became head of the world organization. General Booth will land at Toronto on November 1 and after a week's visit in that city he will proceed to Winnipeg. Later he will inspect the work of the Salvation Army and deliver public addresses in many of the leading cities of the United States.

## BOARD OF ARBITRATION FOR ST. JOHN MEN.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 22.—It is announced that the Board of Arbitration in connection with the trouble between the steaming companies has been appointed, and will at once begin work. The members of the board, who live at St. John, include J. E. Tighe for the men, J. E. Moore for the companies, and Walter E. Foster chairman, agreed to by the other two.

More than a thousand men are demanding higher pay and better working conditions, and the companies include those in the Canadian Shipping Federation and also the C. P. R.

## MORE DEFECTIVES IN THE DOMINION.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—A bulletin just issued by the Census and Statistics Office gives the result of enumeration of the defective classes in Canada—blind, deaf and dumb, insane and idiotic—in the census of 1911. The number of blind was 3238; of deaf and dumb, 4584; of insane 14,702 and idiotic 5387; making a total of defectives of 28,611, of which 15,530 were males and 13,081 were females.

In every ten thousand of the population in 1901 there were 31,014 insane and idiotic persons. The proportion fell to 28,874 in the year 1911.

There has been an increase in actual numbers and in proportion of the population of unsound mind in every province excepting New Brunswick. The highest proportion is shown by Prince Edward Island with 41.77 per 10,000 of the population, followed by Ontario with 34.98, Nova Scotia with 23.615 and Quebec with 22.443 per 10,000.

STELLARTON, October 22.—Dr. Elliot, who has practised in this town for many years, during the larger part of which he has been health officer, and family leave tomorrow morning for the Pacific Coast, where they will make their home in future. A few evenings ago over two hundred citizens gathered and presented the doctor with a purse of gold.

## MOTHER'S LIFE SAVED BY BABY.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The plaintive cries of a child at a fire escape window in the rear of the third floor at No. 803 East 179th street, the Bronx quickly led neighbors yesterday afternoon to find the child's mother, who was near death from gas, and only the quick work of a pulmotor saved her life.

An hour before the child's cries were heard women in the adjoining flats smelled gas and knocked at the door of Mrs. Lillian Belcher's rooms. She opened the door and in reply to a question said no gas was escaping in her flat and she slammed the door.

When the cries of her little daughter Gladys, three years old, were heard at the window Mrs. Carberry, a neighbor, climbed out and drew the girl from the room. Mrs. Carberry kissed me and then locked me in the back room," she sobbed. "I could hear her crying for a time but when I called to her she was still."

Mrs. Carberry and other women climbed into the room, forced the locked door and in the kitchen found all the gas jets open and Mrs. Belcher unconscious on the floor. They called Dr. Collazza from the Fordham Hospital and after he had applied the pulmotor for nearly an hour he said Mrs. Belcher would recover. She was sent to the hospital a prisoner.



## SEVERE STORM IS RAGING IN ST. LAWRENCE.

QUEBEC, Oct. 22.—A severe storm is raging over the Lower St. Lawrence, and a number of small craft, have come to grief, some were wrecked and others waterlogged. No lives have been reported lost.

The schooner Cyrene, belonging to Captain Wilfred Gulmond, which left here on Tuesday last, for Ste. Anne Des Monts, with a general cargo, was wrecked near Crane Island, but the crew was taken off.

A schooner belonging to Charles Mignon, of Murray Bay, is anchored off Crane Island wharf, while an unknown schooner is ashore west of the same place. Another unknown schooner is adrift in the same locality.

## LARGEST WOODEN SAILING VESSEL.

DIGBY, N. S., Oct. 21.—Two weeks out from Sydney, the bark Calburga, Captain Lewis, the largest wooden sailing ship afloat, arrived at Digby Light yesterday afternoon. Later she was taken in tow by the Steamer Cranville, but could not get in through Digby Cut until this morning, on account of the heavy weather.

After discharging ballast the Calburga loads over 1,000,000 feet of lumber here for River Platte.
