work and staff from Prince Edward Island to the Mainland, I beg to state that information has been brought to my attention from which I quote:

"We decided some little time ago that, in order to carry on our work properly and economically, we must have Regional accounting in place of Divisional accounting. Under the old arrangement each Superintendent had an accounting department that worked well all over the Region, which, in the case of the Atlantic Region, is Moncton. I may say we are the only large railway system on the North American continent that has had in effect a Divisional system of accounting, which is expensive both in money and personnel. So many things have recently gone into effect from various departments in Ottawa under the new system, such as Tax at the source, unemployment insurance, cost of living bonus, etc., that it is imperative that the matter be done when it can be under the supervision of an experienced staff. It would be too much for us to expect these clerks at Moncton under the new system. The knowledge required to handle the matter is referred to. So many interpretations are needed, it is of the utmost importance that the work should be centralized so that specialists will be in a position to handle the complex problems which arise from day to day.

"There are only six employees concerned at Charlottetown. One of these has only been in the service a few years, so that we are under no obligation to that man. Any other employee is a single woman who, for family reasons, prefers to remain at Charlottetown. She has about eight years of service.

"This leaves four, all of whom have agreed to go to Moncton. It may be true that these employees may prefer to live in Charlottetown, but after the situation was explained to them, they all agreed to go to Moncton, realizing that there is no reduction of works in the island today that would be the new arrangement would be much better than if they remained at Charlottetown, where there was still a possibility of promotion available for them.

"There are, of course, other points on our Atlantic Region that will be dealt with in a similar manner, in fact, each other place where there is a Divisional Superintendent located, such as Campbellton, New Glasgow, Edmundston and Halifax will be affected and there will be employees to be transferred from these cities to Moncton under the new system."

It seems that there is no possibility of changing the plan which seems to be in the public interest. Yours very truly,

more men on the force.  
Coun. Chandler said City Police "don't get the co-operation of the Mounted Police in cleaning up the dives." In the opinion of Coun. Mackie the two forces should be able to clean up and close up these dives "inside three weeks."

Coun. A. A. Butler referred particularly to Richmond Street which, he said, was "even worse than King Street." It was time the Chief of Police and Inspector of the Mounted Police got together and cleaned up that street. It could be done in 24 hours, he asserted.

Mayor Holman announced that he would have Chief A. Birwell, City Caster and Geneographer, meet with him and see what could be done.

Coun. A. T. MacKinnon was named to supervise arrangements to repair the roof of the Public Library. As trustee of the Library he brought the matter to the attention of the Council citing the need for immediate repairs to

the building. In conversation with Premier Campbell he had been informed that the Provincial Government would defray half the expenses. The cost of the work is not to exceed \$200.

The matter of the street lighting on Kent Street was again brought up for discussion but it was decided to let the matter stand pending further word from the Maritime Electric Company.
