BOTH lots of boats crossed from Cape Tormentine to Cape Traverse yesterday bringing two days' mail, consisting of 134 bags of mail. The mail special arrived here at 11.55 a.m. One lot of boats returned to the other side arriving there about noon.

The presentation was made by Mr. David Rogers of Freetown, who, speaking in the name of the company and of the parishioners generally, referred to the high esteem in which Mr. Wightman was held by all classes, as well as to their regrets at his departure from their midst. Mr. Wightman though thoroughly surprised and nonplussed, fittingly and feelingly responded, expressing his deep regard for the people of the Margate circuit, and while he thanked them most heartily for their generous gift in itself, he valued it much more as a token of their love and regard. Mr. Wightman goes to Bedeque in July next.

R. J. LESLIE, of Leshe, Hart and Co. leaves for England by the steamer London City today. His mission is to select a suitable steamer for the Magdalen Islands, Cape Breton and P. E. Island steamboat service, the contract for the carrying of which he has recently been awarded by the department of trade and commerce. This contract has been in the hands of a Quebec firm for twenty years and it will no doubt be pleasing to Nova Scotians to have it come this way for a few years at least. The interests of patrons of the route will be carefully looked after whether in Quebec or Nova Scotia. That the interests of the former province will be safeguarded may be inferred from the fact that Mr. Leslie's headquarters, so far as the operation of most of his firm's enterprise is concerned, are in the Magdalen Islands, which provincially at attached to Quebec. At the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Rifle Association Wednesday night, it was resolved to ask the local government for \$200 for the Canadian building at Bisley. It was also decided to ask the Nova Scotia and P. E. Island associations to put off the inter-provincial matches, usually fired on June 14th, to a later date and to adopt regulations suitable for the new rifle.

REFERRING to a letter in the Examiner under the heading "More Information Wanted," Mr. Jonathan McWilliams, of Brackley Point Road, called yesterday at the GUARDIAN office and made the following statement: "I deny emphatically that the larger part of the milk sold by me is supplied from other hands. I can supply my whole trade in summer and most of it in winter. Can the anonymous 'milk vendor' who writes to the Examiner say as much? I only procure milk from one person outside my own premises in winter, that is Mr. George Clark and have arranged with him when opportunity offers to have his herd also tested. I can only attribute the letter of 'Milk Vendor' to that unhappy feeling of envy which is always to be found in small minds. I know the cause of this deliberate attempt to injure my business."

THE funeral of Dr. Wallace McMillan, who died suddenly at the City Hospital on Friday, was held yesterday afternoon at the Stantun Avenue M. E. Church, Dochester. The services were largely attended and were conducted by the Rev. C. H. Stackpole, assisted by the Rev. J. P. Kennedy, a former pastor of the church, and the Rev. Carey W. Chamberlain of the Dorchester Temple Baptist Church. The pall-bearers were F. H. Nowell and J. Mattiford, representing the A. O. U. W.; Daniel MacPeerson and John W. Dow, representing the Scottish Clans; John J. Kennedy and Andrew J. Sullivan, representing the Lauriat Avenue Improvement Association, and F. M. Richardson and A. H. Green representing the Independent Order of Oddfellows. Interment was in Mount Hope Cemetery.—Boston Herald, April 5.

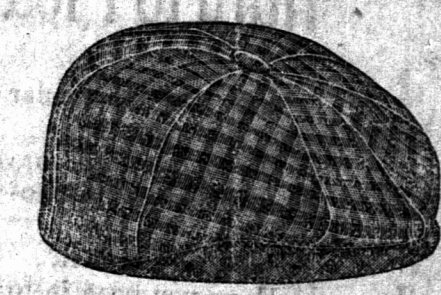
