WESTERN NEWSPAPER MEN ARE JAILED

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 24.—Four hours after being jailed for contempt of court by Judge Galt at the Agricultural College enquiry on Saturday...

"I commit you to the common jail for one month," said the Judge. Knox Magee took the oath, and said he wrote the article in the Post.

After an adjournment of nearly two hours the Commission resumed and Judge Galt handed to the Deputy Sheriff warrants committing Edward Beck, D. B. Deacon, Stanley Beck and Knox Magee to jail.

"I feel," said Mr. Phillips, "that these articles cannot serve any purpose other than to bring into contempt of court the Commission."

"Before I am sworn I would like to make a statement," said Mr. Beck. "First I would like to have read the Commission's report which this investigation is being held."

"I will not take the oath until I have made my statement," was the reply.

The Judge then told Mr. Beck to proceed. "Acting under what I considered proper advice," said Mr. Beck, "I decline to submit to examination before this Commission which is illegal, unlawful and without jurisdiction."

"I decline to be examined," "You do not seem to realize your position," said the Commissioner.

"What is the evidence that this man is editor of the paper?" was asked. Mr. Phillips replied that his name appeared as editor in the columns of the Telegram.

"You're in contempt," said the Commissioner to Mr. Beck. "I order that you be imprisoned in the common jail in Winnipeg for a period of one month and pay a fine of \$500."

Mr. Beck was given in custody of the court official. B. R. Deacon was then called. He took the oath without objection.

"Were you not aware," asked the Judge, "that the whole basis of the article was equally false?"

"It came to me from a source that under its construction or the laws of the country to punish me or anyone else for contempt."

"It was very gross contempt of this tribunal," declared Commissioner Galt. "I order that you be committed to jail for two weeks and pay a fine of \$100."

Stanley Beck, who was sworn, said he would not concede that there were any falsehoods in the story.

"You gave the information on which it was based?" "I presume I did," was the reply.

"I commit you to the common jail for one month," said the Judge. Knox Magee took the oath, and said he wrote the article in the Post.

After an adjournment of nearly two hours the Commission resumed and Judge Galt handed to the Deputy Sheriff warrants committing Edward Beck, D. B. Deacon, Stanley Beck and Knox Magee to jail.

A. J. Andrews was present and told the Commissioner that he was instructed to say that Edward Beck was prepared to be sworn and testify if given an opportunity. He had desired to see the Commission authorizing the enquiry so that he might know its scope.

"No," said the Commissioner, "I'm through with Beck. He is sentenced and to jail he must go." Mr. Andrews said Mr. Beck had no intention of disobeying his subpoena, so far as the purpose of the enquiry was concerned.

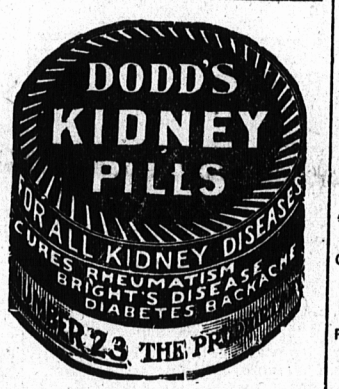
"It is time we let the people of this province understand that the administration of justice in this province must not be interfered with either by news papers or by individual," said the Commissioner, and if they do they must be checked up."

The Commission adjourned till three o'clock and shortly afterwards the four newspapermen were taken by the officers to jail. It is understood that application for their release on habeas corpus proceedings will be made, and that the legality of their committal will be contested.
