Some mackerel are still off West River but the catches are small lately, high winds and strong tides interfering with the operations of the fishermen. Quite a fleet of boats and dories from Rollo Bay to North Lake have gathered for the harvest of the sea, but that pest of the fishermen, the detestable dogfish is here again in increased numbers, and will likely frighten the mackerel out of these waters as no other fish appear to stay in their company. Hake fishing may be said to be a failure this year, probably owing to the presence of this Ishmael of the sea, and that means a shortage of thousands to our fishermen and business men.
