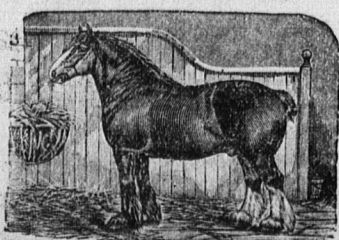

Oh yes, there is another, George Brady, and there is not one of us who received a thing from Charlottetown. I wish you would send me some papers, and also a magazine or two every week, as we have nothing out here but a few papers, once in a while. Well mother, we are not allowed to tell much news, our letters are all read here, before they leave. Well I guess I will close for this time, with love to all. I remain your loving son, Ira Stewart.—Belgium, May 3, 1915. Dear mother,—I received your letter a few days ago, and was glad to receive a line from you as it is a long time since I had a letter from you. I am writing this, and the ground is shaking from the report of the guns and the bursting of the shells. I am still safe and sound though, and I hope to be for a long time yet. We have not had many casualties so far in the First Battery, although there has been very hard fighting here, and a lot of artillery fire on both sides. Remember me to Aunt Elmira and give her my love, for I have not time to write to anyone now. I am bicycle messenger for our battery, and have to go with all the messages for them. Well I have not much news to write this time so I will close. Love to all. I remain as ever, your loving son, Ira Stewart.

**KNOWN IN CHARLOTTETOWN.**—The appointment of Thomas A. Duff, of Toronto, as an honorary Lieutenant-Colonel in the Canadian Militia, appears in the last issue of the Canada Gazette. Few men in Canada are better known from coast to coast than Col. Duff. Since the war broke out he has rendered great service to the Department of Militia, as a transport officer and in an advisory capacity. (Col. T. A. Duff, above referred to, is well and favourably known throughout this Province, especially by members of the L. O. A. He has visited the Province on several occasions in the interests of that Order, and his many friends here will be pleased to learn that his ability has been recognized by the Militia Department at Ottawa.)

**TO VISIT P. E. I.**—A St. John exchange says that Mr. F. L. Drayton, assistant plant pathologist in the Dominion department of agriculture, Ottawa, is in the city, accompanied by his assistant, George Partridge. The Government is conducting a series of experiments in connection with the powdery scab, and they are visiting the stations to investigate the results. Mr. Drayton said Monday that so far they had not been able to reproduce the disease in Ottawa and they were now bending their energies to discover whether the disease was the result of special climatic or soil conditions in affected regions. He has also visited the experimental farm at Fredericton Junction, and from St. John will go to Keltville, N. S., and thence to P. E. Island and then to Quebec.

**PATRIOTIC MEETING FOR TUESDAY.**—At the request of Colonel Kirkpatrick and officers of the 55th Battalion P. E. I. and New Brunswick Regiment, an emergent meeting was called last night in the Armouries—Rev. Dr. Fullerton presiding—at which it was resolved to have a large meeting in the Armouries on Tuesday night to emphasize the splendid part played by the Canadians at Langemarck and Hill 60, and at the same time to arouse interest and enthusiasm in the call for assistance which is now being addressed to Canada.

**PROGRESSIVE FARMERS.**—Marshfield has always been noted for its live stock. For years past the Ayrshires of Marshfield have been seen in the leading exhibitions. Chief among the exhibitors Mr. John Ferguson and Mr. Chas. Robertson. Of late years the difficulty of securing labor has prevented them from exhibiting as much as they did before, but they still have superior herds of Ayrshires—of good producing quality. Mr. Ferguson has in his stable a herd of 18 Pure Bred Ayrshires, bred entirely for utility purposes. The milk is weighed daily and a record kept, so that the production of each cow can be kept track of for years. Mrs. Roper has for some years managed the Poultry. She is a familiar figure in the market, and anyone who has once bought from her remembers the very large and well fattened geese and cockerels, as well as the uniform eggs which she has for sale. Mr. Charles Robertson has not had as long an experience in breeding of Ayrshires as Mr. Ferguson, but his name is always in the breeding of Ayrshires as Mr. Ferguson's, but his name is always prominent in the Prize List. Both of these men nearly always have some particularly good stock to offer to the market, but Ayrshires are not the only class of cattle that are making their mark in Marshfield. Mr. W. J. Gibson has started to build up a herd of Pure Bred Holsteins, and he has two Pure Bred cows of more than usual merit. He always uses the best bulls that can be had, and has now at the head of the herd one of the best he could secure from the herd of Dickie of Onslow, N. S. It will be remembered that last year at the Maritime Winter Fair, one of Dickie's Holsteins broke the world's record for milk production. Mr. Gibson has filled a large order for Western Canada last year. He took out a car load and they proved so satisfactory that he received another order. It is breeders like this who are not afraid to risk their money in high priced cattle that are building up farming in Prince Edward Island, and it is hoped their example will be followed by many others.
