

U. S. WILL NOT WIN TERRITORY BY CONQUEST

(Canadian Press) MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 27.—The president announced to the world to-day that the governing motive of the United States in its relationship with the countries of this hemisphere would be morality, not expediency.

HARRY K. THAW AGAIN IN COURT

(Canadian Press.) ROCHESTER, N. H., Oct. 27.—Gov. Felker, after hearing both sides today, granted the request of Harry K. Thaw for further continuance in extradition proceedings, setting November 4 as the final date on which his attorneys may file a supplementary brief bearing on the conspiracy indictment returned against their client by the New York County Jury.

MRS. PANKHURST NOT TO SPEAK

(Canadian Press) INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 27.—Mrs. Pankhurst, the English suffragette, will not address the Women's Franchise League of Indiana as was planned, the engagement being cancelled to-day by the League officials.

PRISON REFORM COMMISSION ADJOURNED TILL NOVEMBER

KINGSTON, Ont., October 27.—The prison reform commission adjourned this afternoon and will not resume its sessions here until early in November. It will hold a sitting in Toronto next week to receive expert testimony with regard to the central prison and prison farm at Guelph.

TORONTO MAY ENGAGE IN MEAT BUSINESS

TORONTO, Oct. 24.—The City of Toronto may engage in the wholesale meat business. If the City Council endorses the action of the Board of Control, a plebiscite will be taken on January 1st, on the question: "Are you in favor of the city engaging in the dead meat trade to supply retailers, and to raise \$200,000 by an issue of debentures in order to carry on this business?"

OFFENCES AGAINST THE IMPERIAL LAWS

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 25.—Three Finnish members of the Viborg Municipal Council have been tried in the St. Petersburg district court and sentenced to the highest penalty of the law, namely, six months' imprisonment, for a third offense against the Imperial law, which declares that Russians born in Finland shall have the same rights as Finlanders.

JUDGE ACQUITS SHERBROOKE BOY WHO SHOT COMRADE

SHERBROOKE, October 15.—F. Royer, the 12-year-old boy who shot and wounded another lad named Cayer, last Saturday afternoon, appeared before Judge Mulvena yesterday afternoon. After hearing the evidence the boy was discharged, the judge holding that the evidence was such that it showed no intentional shooting on the part of Royer.

WEALTHY CHINESE OPTUM DEALER RAIDED IN TORONTO

TORONTO, October 25.—For the third time within a year the police have entered houses and stores owned by Lee Jim, who is reputed to be Canada's wealthiest Chinaman, and arrested him for having opium in his possession.

ANOTHER ARREST IN BANK OF MONTREAL ROBBERY

CHICAGO, Ill., October 24.—Michael Flanagan, a saloon keeper, was arrested here today on charges of having in his possession and passing, altered or counterfeit Canadian bank notes. The arrest was made in connection with the search for the men who robbed the New Westminster branch of the Bank of Montreal, of \$271,000, Sept. 14, 1911.

SOLDIER FINED FOR INSUBORDINATION AT BRANTFORD, ONT.

BRANTFORD, October 25.—Charged with the offence of disobeying his superior officer, Private Ed. Walker, of the 88th Central Postal Directory, was fined \$10 by Magistrate Livingston in the Police Court.

PREMIER MCBRIDE CREATES A FURORE IN OTTAWA

(Special To The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 27.—Sir Richard McBride, Premier of British Columbia, who was guest of the Canadian Club at luncheon today, created rather a furore when he launched into the naval question in his speech. It is a cardinal rule of the club that nothing political in its nature should be mentioned at the club addresses, but Sir Richard McBride came out in no uncertain tones on the naval question.

SPENT THE NIGHT WANDERING ABOUT WITHOUT CLOTHES

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Oct. 22.—Attired only in a barrel packed with a small quantity of straw, Alfred Sara, a local clerk, spent part of a night wandering around in the snow and rain twenty miles down shore from here and when found by a search party, was delirious and in a serious condition.

CANADIAN FINANCIAL COMMUNITY IN LONDON FAVORS ALDWYCH SITE

LONDON, Oct. 25.—From enquiries in city circles the Canadian Associated Press learns that concerted action is probable by the Canadian financial community established here in an endeavor to persuade the authorities to reconsider the suitability of the Strand-Aldwych site for the new Dominion offices in preference to the site at Westminster, which at present seems to find the most favor with the powers that be.

\$35,000 BALM FOR BROOKLYN SCHOOL TEACHER

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—A jury in the supreme court placed a value yesterday afternoon of \$35,000 upon the services of Miss Mary McIntyre, a Brooklyn school teacher. A verdict awarding her this sum was returned in her \$150,000 suit against William Hughes, a manufacturer of paper boxes, for alleged breach of promise to marry. Miss McIntyre is about 40 years old, Mr. Hughes 65.

RICHMOND BUTLER CHARGED WITH ASSISTING THAW

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Richmond Butler, formerly a member of the State Assembly, came into court today to surrender himself on an indictment for conspiracy found against him and others last week, for assisting in the escape of Harry K. Thaw from Matteawan.

MEXICAN REBELS IN POSSESSION OF MONTEREY

(Canadian Press) LAREDO, Texas, Oct. 27.—Advices from constitutionalist sources in Monterey received to-day, state that fierce fighting is under way in the streets. The rebels are in possession of the railway depot and have artillery plants which sweep the surrounding streets. While not in the centre of the city, their position is a commanding one.

JUDGE LINDSAY RECEIVES OFFER TO GO ON STAGE

DENVER, Oct. 25.—Judge B. B. Lindsay has refused an offer to appear on the stage as a full fledged actor.

"Oliver Morosco, a Los Angeles theatrical manager, offered to launch the judge on a stage career by giving him a leading part in Sam Harris' play, 'The Little Offender.' Harris placed one of the principal scenes in a juvenile court. The play will be produced soon in Los Angeles. Both Morosco and Harris wrote letters to Judge Lindsay, asking him to accept engagement in the play.

CANADIAN CANNERS REDUCE THE PRICE OF TOMATOES

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—The long tomato season and the abundance of the crop has caused the canneries to lower their prices 17-2 cents per dozen cans. This, however, will have little effect on the cost of living, as the retail price will remain the same.

PREMIERS DISCUSS THE MARITIME REPRESENTATION

(Special To The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Oct., Oct. 27.—Representation from the Maritime Provinces in the Federal house was discussed today by Provincial Premiers behind closed doors. No conclusion was reached as to arguments put forth by the delegations from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

"That in the opinion of this Conference the representation granted to the Maritime Provinces at the time of Confederation should be restored and made irrevocable. Arguments were advanced setting forth the case that the Maritime Provinces had 40 members at the time of Confederation, whereas now they had but 35. It was claimed that a hardship was being inflicted on the Provinces affected which was not in the least warranted.

GENERAL DIAZ GOING TO FEDERAL CAPITAL

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Oct. 25.—General Felix Diaz today received a request from the Mexican government to proceed to the federal capital. Col. Manuel Vidaurerizaga, secretary to the Mexican minister of war General Aureliano Blanquet, arrived here on a special train, with the invitation which was practically an order for General Diaz to accompany them to Mexico City.

INTERNATIONAL CONTROL OF PHILIPPINES MOOTED

MOHONK LAKE, N. Y., Oct. 25.—Control of the Philippines by an international council was proposed to-day at the Lake Mohonk Conference of Friends of the Indians and other peoples. The suggestion was made by A. S. Lanier, assistant secretary in the Bureau of Justice in the Philippines.

IRISH TRANSPORT STRIKE LEADER FOUND GUILTY

(Canadian Press) DUBLIN, Oct. 27.—James Larkin, leader of the striking Irish Transport Workers, was found guilty today of seditiously inciting riots and was sentenced to seven months' imprisonment. The Attorney-General said at the opening of the case that Larkin was being prosecuted, not because he was a labor leader but because he was a wicked, dangerous criminal. The Irish Transport Workers have been on strike since early in September, and there is much destitution among their families. The English Trades Unions have been sending them provisions to keep them from starving.

BURNING STEAMER RACES TO HALIFAX

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 27.—With the forward deck red-hot from the inferno of flaming cotton below, the South liner Sowell raced into Halifax yesterday afternoon after an experience in mid-ocean closely rivaling that of the ill-starred steamer Volturo. Bearing a cargo worth nearly a million dollars, the Sowell set out from Savannah, Georgia for Havre, France, twelve days ago, calling for coal at Newport News en route. Early last Friday morning smoke was seen arising from ventilators, and then began the battle that has not yet ended.

Immediately after the wedding breakfast, following the solemnisation of the holy vows the happy couple will be driven to the wharf of the Steam Navigation Company where they will take passage on the steamer Northumberland, and begin a wedding tour that will last two months and will include visits to New York, Paris, London and various places in Scotland, where Mr. Cochrane's family home is.
