

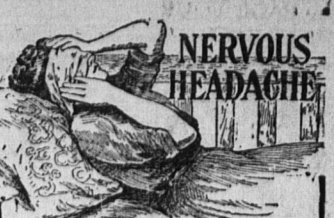

CHURCH PARADES AT VALCARTIER

CAMP VALCARTIER, Quebec, Sept. 12—The weather for the last two weeks has been very sultry with frequent rain storms at night, making the ground quite wet, but the last few days has been fine. Autumn weather with the nights quite cold. Sunday morning was very fine, giving specially favorable conditions for the church parade service. Separate services for the French and English speaking Roman Catholics were held at 8.30 and mass was celebrated at each service at 9.30. The Protestant service was held with the headquarter's staff in attendance. The chaplains taking part were Captains Wood, Barnett, Shives and Thomas. The hymns sung were: "All People that on Earth do Dwell," "Fight the Good Fight," "Onward Christian Soldiers." Captain H. E. Thomas was the preacher and took for his text the Stone Kingdom of Daniel's prophecy. He pointed out that just as God had plans for the individual and family, so He had plans for the nation, and in an early day a people who spoke Hebrew were made his chosen people. There were some promises made to the Israelites which were never fulfilled in the Jew and because these promises were given with God's own oath we had a right to seek for their fulfillment in some people today. Reference was made by Captain Thomas to certain marks of identification which were found in the Anglo-Saxon, and there alone. In an early covenant promise was given of a multitudinous race outnumbering the stars, and statistics were cited to show that the Anglo-Saxons doubled their population every 41 years, while other nations like France and Germany and Turkey lagged far behind. Quotations were made of passages which set forth a people who were to bring a ministry of blessing to the whole earth, undoing burdens and letting the oppressed go free, and again it was shown that in a sense different from that of another nation this was true of Britain. Besides this, some nations were to be found which were invincible for to Israel of old the promise was that she should rule over many nations, but be ruled by none, and in marvelous ways God had marshalled unseen forces for the protection of his chosen people of this modern day. The conclusion was reached that if Britain did not fulfil these conditions then all the present endeavors would fail and she would perish, for there was a people some-
