Willkie May Play Decisive Election Role

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 - (CP) - Wendell L. Willkie, snubbed and rejected early in his campaign to win the Republican Presidential nomination, may yet play a decisive role in next November's elections. Since he quit the race for nomination after the Wisconsin primaries so completely ignored his existence in the pre-convention campaign, Willkie has been content to sit on the sidelines and watch—and occasionally to comment.

Now both parties are anxiously eyeing him and waiting to see which way he moves. Outwardly Republicans profess not to care. But underneath they desperately hope he will throw his weight behind the Dewey-Eyler ticket. Republicans are fearful and Democrats hopeful that Willkie will support the Roosevelt-Truman team. Democrats would be grateful if he would merely remain silent.

The reason for this anxiety is the presence of an estimated 25 per cent of the electorate sitting

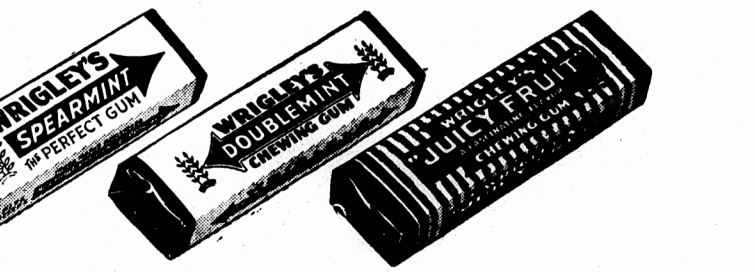
