UNEMPLOYED HEAD OF ROYAL TO INTERVIEW COMMISSION THE MAYOR ARRIVES

Committee Reports Sympathetic Response From Clergy and Gov't. Members.

A meeting of the unemployed of this city was held last evening in the L. P. U. Hall, which was filled to capacity with quite a number unable to obtain entrance. The meeting was called to order by the chairman, Mr. Daniel Coughlin, at 8.15, who reported that the committee waited on the Government and Councillor Kennedy, also the clergy of the city. Hon. Mr. Sharp, Minister of Public Works, said that the amount expended for last month for relief through the churches was \$527.00.

Mr. Peter J. Morrison spoke on the Committee waiting on the Government and Mr. Kennedy. Accompanied by Mr. Coughlin, he had a personal interview with the Rev. Mr. Legate, who was very much in sympathy with the unemployed of our city, and who said it was very essential to have an increase from the city on the monthly relief allowance to cope with the situation, and he would, along with the other clergy interview the Mayor and Council in behalf of the unemployed. Councillor Kennedy stated he could not do anything until we had an interview with the Mayor.

Mr. Morrison spoke very highly of the reception given the Committee by the Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, and the Hon. Shelton Sharp, who were in whole-hearted sympathy with the unemployed, they said that at no time did they intimate to the City Council to discontinue relief and that they were in no way responsible for relief in the cities or municipalities but were to bear the burden of the Rural districts. They are at present paying 1-3 of the relief being distributed and will continue to do so, regardless of what increase the City Council should make in the relief which is to be distributed through the clergy of the city. At all times they would be delighted to meet a committee of the unemployed, and do all in their power to relieve the situation which at present exists. The Hon. gentlemen were informed by the committee that there are numerous families in dire circumstances which need immediate attention.

Mr. Joseph was the next speaker he said he waited on the Rev. Mr. Brown, who said he would like to see the relief cases handled in a proper manner. Mr. Phillip Bambrick was also received by the Rev. Fr. Enright, who said he would give them all the support he could, but they were limited to a certain amount. Hon. Mr. Sharp said he would take it up with Children's Aid Society, concerning the children being sent to school properly equipped. Mr. Stanley Steele who was the next speaker spoke along the same lines as the other members of the committee, it was then moved and seconded that the report of the committee be received. One city gentleman, a business man, said he was in sympathy with the unemployed. He said when the working man hasn't a dollar to spend, the business man also feels it. He also made a suggestion that the centre ground of the Exhibition Race Track could be removed and used to fill up low land by the Rifle Range and so add to the appearance of City property. This would give work for both men and horses. Mr. Earle Riggs also made a suggestion that the city be asked to float a loan of \$40,000 to build thirty or forty houses for the unemployed men, and the families be given those houses on the rent installment plan. Mr. Swallow next asked the chairman what was to be done if Mayor Stewart ignored their request, he also said there should be a labor candidate in the next civic election, and one in the Provincial Legislature. Mr. Morrison was to ask the City Council for the market square for Exhibition Week in aid of the unemployed. It was then moved and seconded that the Committee interview the Mayor and clergy to have conditions remedied by four o'clock Monday afternoon. The motion passed unanimously. Mr. Lemuel Rush spoke along the same lines as the Committee. There were several other speakers including Mr. Dan Gillis, Pres. of the L. P. U., also Mr. John White, Mr. Reaney Gallant. On motion, the meeting adjourned, with the singing of the National Anthem. —P. J. Morrison, for Committee.

EMPRESS OF BRITAIN, Aug. 3.—(C.P.)—A careful and business-like study of Canada's banking and credit system is the aim of Lord MacMillan, who arrived today from London on the liner Empress of Britain to head the Royal Commission recently appointed for that purpose. "We want to do something really useful for Canada," said the author of the MacMillan report made three years ago on the similar problem in England. "We are taking this very seriously and we need the good-will of the Canadian people to make it a success."

On Fourth Trip Lord MacMillan is making his fourth trip to Canada in seven years and is now stranger to Canada. "I am practically a Canadian," he said. "I sit on the Privy Council on many Canadian appeals and on my first visit to Canada I was counsel for Canada in the Labrador boundary case."

An "Orra Man" Lord Advocate of Scotland, Lord MacMillan, proved to be a most affable and friendly personage and humorously described himself as an "Orra Man." "In Scotland," he said, "we call an odd job person an 'Orra Man.' And that's what I am. I am not an expert banker and this is really a side line."

Fine Books On Display NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(C.P.)—Representing the artistic efforts of book-binding designers and craftsmen in these countries, 150 volumes, selected from publications during the past two years, are on exhibition at the Columbia University.

They will be required to pass supplementary examinations in certain subjects before receiving a license to teach in the public schools. Candidates whose names are published herein will be admitted at the opening of the college term and may study for (a) a teacher's license; or (b) a commercial certificate; or (c) an academic certificate leading to a more general education. Students who in this examination have done well in Arithmetic and who may be found at the beginning of the session proficient in Penmanship will be offered in lieu of these subjects a course in Mechanical Drawing at a cost for equipment not exceeding \$3.00. All students who purpose attending Prince of Wales College must request from the college an application form to be filled out and returned to the Prince of Wales College not later than August 20th so that arrangements may be made to classify and accommodate them. Prince of Wales College will begin its session for the academic year 1933-34 on Tuesday, September 5th, when First Year students will present themselves, those from Charlottetown at 10 a.m. and those from the country districts at 1 p.m. Students of the Second Year will be enrolled on Thursday at 10 a.m., and students of the Third and Fourth Years will be enrolled on Friday, September 8th, at 2 p.m. Students' fees will be payable at the college on day of registration. In the case of Third and Fourth Year students they may be paid half yearly. For the First and Second Year students the fees for all courses except the Commercial Course are \$5.00 for country students and \$10.00 for students from Charlottetown. For Commerce students the fees are \$20 for those from the country and \$35.00 for those from Charlottetown. For Third Year the fees are \$50.00 and \$75.00, and for the Fourth Year \$100.00 and \$150.00 respectively for country and Charlottetown students. The public schools having mid-summer holidays of six weeks will open on Tuesday, August 15th, the course of study being the same as last year.
