## SUMMARY DISMISSAL

Rev. Dr. McNeill Removed From Office.

## 26 YEARS IN SERVICE

He is Not Aware of Giving Offence to the Present Administration.

It was learned yesterday with general surprise and regret that the Provincial Government had removed Rev. Donald McNeill from the position of Clerk to the Chief Superintendent of Education. A GUARDIAN representative waited upon Mr. McNeill at his home yesterday afternoon, and upon request was shown the order of the Government, of which the following is a copy:

19th May, 1899.

SIR:—I am directed to inform you that His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in Council has been pleased to appoint E. Stewart McPhail, Esq., Craipud Corner, Clerk to the Chief Superintendent of Education in your stead. Appointment to take effect 1st July, 1899.

Rev. Mr. McNeill was appointed to a position in the Education Office by the Liberal Government in 1873. Up to 1877 he had sole charge of the office. At the passing of the present School Act in that year the office of Chief Superintendent was created. Mr. Manning was appointed to that position and Mr. McNeill was continued as clerk, under him as he was under Messrs. Montgomery, Nicholson and McLeod who have since succeeded to the position of Superintendent.

## HER EIGHTIETH BIRTHDAY.



LONDON, May 22.—Socially the wreck has been the busiest of the year. Queen Victoria's visit to London gave it a necessary enlivening. The ceremony of laying the foundation stone of the South Kensington Museum proved a highly successful pageant and gave the people here an opportunity to indulge in a great local demonstration, and the state ball on Thursday evening gathered a great many society people at Buckingham Palace.

The Prince of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Prince and Princess Christian, Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke and Duchess of Fife, the Duke of Cambridge and the Crown Prince of Siam (Prince Chowfa Maha Vajiravudh.) were among those present. The dancing commenced at eleven o'clock, in the magnificent salon, and lasted until daybreak.

The approaching ceremonies at Windsor will be most interesting, upon the occasion of Her Majesty's birthday. Next Wednesday morning, the Queen will receive the congratulations of her family and will then be serenaded in the grand quadrangle of the Castle by a choir of 250 voices, which the Queen will listen from the oak room overlooking the quadrangle.

At noon the Scots Fusilier Guards will march past the Queen on the east lawn and fire a feu de joie. A thank-giving service in St. George's chapel will follow. The Queen will then drive to Windsor, passing under a magnificent floral arch erected on Castle Hill, and in the evening "Lohengrin" will be given by the opera company in the Waterloo chamber.

It is rumored that the Queen, in connection with her birthday, will again offer the Marquis of Salisbury a dukedom, which he refused at the time of her Majesty's jubilee.

## THE PARIS IN THE ASHORE FAR EAST

Efforts May Be Made to Proposed Government for the Philippines.

## GLADSTONE'S DEMISE PRESIDENT TO APPOINT

A Year Ago Recalled--His Memorial Fund Grows But Slowly. Governor-General and Judges Filipinos to Elect Advisory Council.

LONDON, May 22.—(Special)—The S. S. Paris, of the American Line struck yesterday morning on the Manacles Ridge, about half a mile from where the Mohegan lies.

The Paris sailed from Southampton on Saturday, and ran ashore in a dense fog. There were 280 passengers on board all of whom were quickly rescued by life-boats and tugs.

The Paris was built in 1889 at Glasgow; is 580 feet long and her gross tonnage is 10795 tons.

The papers, commenting on the loss of the S. S. Paris demand a better system of buoys.

The situation of the steamer is unchanged, the cargo is being discharged and efforts will probably be made to float her.

The attempt to make the anniversary of Gladstone's death, may 19th, the occasion for a great party demonstration like Primrose Day proud a failure.

The Liberal organs urged the wearing of a white flower, but very few used it.

The Gladstone National Memorial Fund is getting along slowly. There is now only £30,000 subscribed instead of the minimum of £50,000 required.

MANILA, May 22.—(Special)—The Filipino Commission has submitted a proposal for the appointment of a form of government including a Governor General to be appointed by the President; a cabinet appointed by the Governor General; Judges appointed by the President and an advisory council elected by the people.

The Filipinos want time to submit matters to their Congress, but admit the offer is a liberal one.
