MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY OF P. E. ISLAND

At Charlottetown and within the hall of St. James' Church there, on Tuesday the ninth day of May and at the hour of half-past eleven forenoon, at which place and time the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was duly constituted.

Mr. J. M. McLeod Moderator pro tempore with whom were present Messrs Dr. Fullerton, George Miller, A. J. McNeill, John Stirling, H. J. Fraser, A. McKay, John Gillis, J. H. McHattie, A. Sutherland, Mr. D. McLeod, R. L. Coffin, J. A. Greenlee, J. S. McKay, and Dr. McEwen Ministers; and Mr. James Carruthers, Elder.

Rev. Dr. Fullerton was appointed Clerk pro tempore.

The minutes of meetings held on March 7th, April 4th and 18th were read and sustained.

The Clerk read circular letters from various Presbyteries anent applications to the General Assembly for leave to receive ministers from other churches.

The Clerk reported the death of Mr. A. B. McLeod, which took place on April 19th. On motion the name was removed from the roll and the following resolution: Dr. Fullerton, Messrs J. M. McLeod, and J. A. Greenlee, the committee later submitted the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"In removing the name of the late A. B. McLeod from the roll, the Presbytery hereby places on record its high appreciation of the ability, fidelity and zeal which he displayed in the work of the church during his ministry of thirty-five years. Mr. McLeod's ministrations as preacher and pastor were earnest and forcible and of the highest order. The services which he performed in his latter years as our Chaplain at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, although he himself was such a great sufferer, were owing to his deep sympathy, genial disposition, suitable and tender ministrations, of inestimable value to the afflicted and the dying in the institution and to the loved ones at home in their grief and bereavement.

To the bereaved widow and daughter and to the sorrowing relatives we tender our most sincere sympathy, and commend them to the comfort and consolation of our Heavenly Father, Who is ever the Strength of the fainting heart, and the Light of the darkened home.

The Clerk was instructed to forward a copy of the foregoing resolution to Mrs. McLeod.

Commissioners to the General Assembly were appointed as follows: Ministers, Messrs J. H. McHattie and M. D. McLeod, vice Messrs J. M. McLeod and G. C. Taylor, resigned; Elders, Messrs T. C. James and D. Schurman, vice Messrs D. McInnis and J. Carruthers, resigned.

The Clerk was instructed to fill any vacancies that may occur in the representation of elders, and the following ministers were appointed additional alternates: Messrs John Stirling, Dr. Fullerton and J. A. Greenlee; Dr. Fullerton reported for the committee which was appointed to make allocations for the Schemes and on motion the following recommendations were adopted:
