Halifax Retains Two Tennis Titles

N. S. Tournament Concluded On Saturday - Stars Will Play At Charlottetown This Week.

HALIFAX, Aug. 7.—(By The Canadian Press)—Four Nova Scotia tennis titles were awarded on Saturday following a series of brisk matches under a broiling sun: Men's singles—Commander J. C. Edwards of Ottawa. Women's singles—Miss Evelyn Hely of Montreal. Men's doubles—Harry Roper and Bevil Piers of Halifax. Women's doubles—Mrs. F. V. Woodbury and Miss Mary Currie of Halifax. Competition in the mixed doubles will be concluded tomorrow, following which the high-liners will strike out for Charlottetown to cop some of the Prince Edward Island titles. The P. E. I. tournament opens tomorrow. After eliminating Laird Watt of Montreal, this year's Ontario cham-

plion, Edwards defeated Bevil Piers in the final with scores of 6-1, 6-1, 6-30. His scores with Watt were 6-2, 6-1, 6-2. Roper and Piers won the men's doubles by defeating Edwards and Don Sanderson, Halifax youth, in the greatest battle of the day: 3-6, 6-1, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3. To win the women's doubles, Miss Hely took the women's singles crown by defeating Miss Mary Currie, 3-6, 6-2, 7-5. Miss Currie had eliminated Mrs. Harold Jones, 1931 champion, 7-5, 3-6, 6-4. To win the women's doubles, Mrs. Woodbury and Miss Currie defeated Miss E. Odevalne and Miss Hely in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4. Only one match was played in the mixed doubles yesterday. J. Neathe and Mrs. H. Harvey of Halifax defeated Prof. C. H. Mercer of Halifax and Miss E. Scully of Saint John.

More Records Are Shattered At The Olympics

U. S. Athletes Clean Up Three Relays While "Babe" Didrikson Sets New World Mark For High Jump.

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer) OLYMPIC STADIUM, Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—Investigators of the most unbridled orgy of record breaking in athletic history, the United States clinaxed its drive for titles and world beating times and distance by setting up four new marks today as athletes of the world completed the track and field programme of the 10th Modern Olympic Games. When wee Willie Carr, of Pennsylvania, shot across the finish line late this afternoon, carrying a baton that gave America a relay grand slam, it sent recorders hurrying to write down new record No. 24 in the Olympic book. Too, it swelled the United States record shattering feats for the day to four.

Tanks Were Unbeatable

Canada was unable to beat the United States in the three relays that finished the track show. Percy Williams of Vancouver, Buster Brown and Harold Wright of Edmonton and Bert Pearson of Hamilton were fourth in the 400 metre team event; Ray Lewis of Hamilton, and Alex Wilson of Montreal were third in the 1,600 metre relay and Mary Friswell and Lillian Palmer of Vancouver, Kildred Friszel of Toronto and Hilda Strike of Montreal were second in the 400 metre relay for women.

Won Handily

America won all the three races. The United States sprinters, Emmett Toppino, Bob Kiesel, Hec Dyer and Frank Wykoff, established a new world record of 40 seconds.

Wins Marathon

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 7.—Juan Carlos Zabala of Argentina today won the classic Olympic Marathon, beating Sam Ferris of Great Britain by 200 yards. A. Toivonen of Finland third.

ADD MORE RECORDS

The little Montreal flash ran frantically in an effort to catch her opponent but she could only gain a single yard, Miss Von Bremen getting to the tape in front. The officials time was announced as 47 seconds but timers actually caught the Americans in 46 9/10 and the Canadian in 47. A tenth of a second is not recognised in Olympic relay events. Edwards and Wilson made gallant efforts to get Canada into the running for the 1,600-metre relay after Lewis and Ball had lost ground in the first two legs. Edwards gained on both Lord Burginley, third leg British runner and Warner of the United States, but Wilson had an impossible task in catching the leaders, Carr, and Rampling, England's anchor man. The classic marathon provided a dramatic climax to the day's thrilling programme, the laurel wreath of victory being placed on the brow of the spectacular Argentine runner Juan Carlos Zabala, who set a new Olympic record of two hours 31 minutes 36 seconds for the 26 miles 385 yards route. Sam Ferris of Great Britain finished second with A. Toivonen of Finland in third place. The Englishman finished for the Finn, both times under the old Olympic record. It was a gruelling and thrilling race in which Zabala set the pace most of the way. Cliff Bricker of Galt, Ont., ran a strong race for the first 10 miles, trailing Zabala by only a few yards up to that point. He tired, however, and finished 12th. The other Canadians, Johnny Miles of Hamilton, Ont., and Edward Cudworth of Toronto, finished 14th and 18th respectively.

CANADIANS ELIMINATED IN SWIMS

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 7.—Even the veteran Walter Spence of Montreal, only Canadian swimmer who has held his own in international competition in other years, found the speed of the new swimming stars too great in the opening water clashes at the Olympic Games.

Winner in his 100-metre preliminary heat Saturday morning, Spence was eliminated in the afternoon semi-finals as Japan served notice she is prepared to pick up the sprint crown thrown aside by Johnny Weismuller. Spence was fourth, Kawahashi, of Japan winning in 59 3-5 seconds. Schwartz of United States, was second and another Japanese, Takahashi, got in ahead of Spence. In the other semi-final, Miasaki of Japan won in Olympic record time of 58 seconds. Barany of Hungary, was fourth in this heat, but reached the final because his time of 59 2-5 was better than that of Spence. Even the famous Helene Madison, United States, was outswam in preliminary heats of the women's 100-metre free-style. The Seattle girl won her heat in 68 9-10 seconds, but a few minutes later Eleanor Saville, another American, lowered this mark by two-fifths of a second, breaking the Olympic record.

Canada's three entries—Marjorie Linton, Irene Mullen and Irene Pirie, all of Toronto—were eliminated in the first trials. Miss Linton finished fifth in the first heat, Miss Mullen fifth in the second, where Joyce Cooper, won in 72 1-5 and Miss Pirie fourth in the heat won by Miss Saville. OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, Los Angeles, Aug. 7.—The Olympic record, three broken yesterday in the women's 100-metres free-style swimming trials, was again washed out and a new Olympic and world's record established in the 10th Olympic championship semi-finals of the event by Miss Willemuntje Denouden, Holland, here today. Her new time was 1:07.6. Mary Carey gave the American team a two-foot edge on the first leg, she and Mildred Friszell stepping several yards away from the field. Lillian Palmer ran a great second leg to send Mary Friszell away in front and the Vancouver star retained the margin. But her pass to Hilda Strike was delayed, Miss Strike getting away fully two yards behind' Wilhelmina Von Bremen of the United States.

Records Continue To Fall At Games

Marks In The 400 And 1600 Metre Relays Lowered In Semi-Finals On Saturday.

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer.) LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 7.—Records stand only to be broken at these Olympic Games and United States athletes for no particular reason, smashed a couple more on Saturday. Without any incentive to stretch their legs at all in qualifying for the finals of the 400-metre and 1600-metre relay finals. Two American teams of runners went out on a speed orgy. The 400-metre quartette lowered world record to 40 3-5 seconds, and then the 1600-metre brigade pulled down the world mark in this event to 3 minutes, 11 4-5 seconds. Like most other teams, Canada was content to qualify for both relay finals. The 100-metre band, Percy Williams of Vancouver, Buster Brown and Harold Wright of Edmonton, and Bert Pearson of Hamilton, loafed around the track to finish third behind United States, and Italy. Only three teams were in the race so there was no particular hurry, except for Americans Kiesel, Toppino, Dyer and Wykoff. Four set of runners started in the second heat of the 1600-metre relay and qualifiers were Japan, Great Britain and Canada. Mexico's team was well back at the finish as Alex Wilson of Montreal trotted home beside Godfrey Rampling, English star. Phil Edwards and Ray Lewis of Hamilton and Jimmy Ball of Winnipeg, had made qualifying berths safe for Canada, Edwards steaming around the track like a confirmed quarter-mile though he specialized at 800 and 1500. Decathlon entrants held the main spotlight today, completing the last five events on their two day programme. Finland easily won the 3000 metre steeplechase. Iso-Hollo leading the way. Tom Evenson, Great Britain, was second and J. P. McCuskey, United States third. It was announced after the race that the contestant had run one lap too many, Iso-Hollo's time for approximately 3450 metres being 10 minutes 33 2-5 seconds. His time for the actual 3000 metres 9:18 2-5, settings a new Olympic record. The runners agreed to let the race stand as run.
