CONFIRMATION SERVICES.—Yesterday the sacrament of Confirmation was administered to a number of persons in the Anglican Churches of Charlottetown at St. Paul's in the morning and at St. Peter's in the evening service. At both services the Archbishop of Nova Scotia, the Most Rev. Clarendon L. Worrell, officiated, addressing the candidates. At St. Paul's 17 young persons were confirmed and they were given an excellent dissertation by the learned Archbishop on "Prayer," and the need of it in Christian life. There was a large congregation, and the singing was splendid. In the evening at St. Peter's 8 boys and 5 girls were confirmed, the candidates being addressed by Archbishop Worrell, who on this occasion spoke on the "Duties of Christians." They were admonished to show to the world, by prayer and good work, their Christianity and their identity with the Church of Christ. They were also exhorted to perform the various duties which fell to them in life with diligence and thoroughness. The service, which began with evensong, was very impressive; and in spite of the very disagreeable weather there was a large congregation.

MORE CANADIAN HONORS SOON.—LONDON, June 15.—Questioned by Donald MacMaster in the House of Commons last night, when the list of Canadian honors and promotions for recent meritorious service might be expected, the Under-Secretary, Mr. Tennant, replied that it would be improper for him to say what the supplemental list might contain, but the issue would not be unduly delayed.

94th SENTRY ASLEEP?—The North Sydney Record says:—It is a fortunate thing for the soldiers quartered in the Archibald Avenue barracks that no evil inclined German was prowling about in the early hours of Saturday morning last. And if reports are true, it would be well for the militia heads here to make further enquiries, and act accordingly. These are war times, and there is nothing like being "on the job" all the time. It seems that among the militiamen sent here to assist the police, if necessary, in keeping under control the negroes who took French leave from the steamer Anglo Brazilian, was a corporal of the guard from the P. E. I., H. A. stationed at Sydney Mines. About 3 o'clock Saturday morning the Corporal, in company with police officer Roy Johnston, took a stroll up Archibald Avenue, and when in front of the 94th barracks stopped, when they noticed a rifle with bayonet attached, reclining in front of the guardhouse. There was not a solitary soul to be seen about the place, and according to the story, the corporal from Sydney Mines and the police officer took the rifle and proceeded down the avenue with the intention of reporting the matter the following morning. Upon a second thought the men retraced their steps and replaced the rifle, and then in loud tones called for the guard, if one was about. Finally a khaki-clad individual appeared, and in answer to questions said he was the officer on guard, that he was up to 4 o'clock. As it was then only about 3 o'clock, the victors perceived that somebody was not fulfilling their duty, and left the place. As stated, it was fortunate the patrolmen were friends and not lurking Germans. Dereliction of duty is a serious offence in army circles, and especially should it be
