THREE WESTERN MEMBERS NOT IN RUNNING

Hon. A. B. Hudson, Hon. T. A. Crerar, and R. A. Hoey Will Not be Candidates.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 10.—The Winnipeg Free Press in its new column today publishes the following: It seems to be generally accepted now that Hon. A. B. Hudson, Liberal, South Winnipeg, will not seek re-election in the forthcoming federal election. It is understood that pressure of legal business has made it necessary for Mr. Hudson to devote his time exclusively to his practice. Hon. T. A. Crerar will be asked to accept the nomination, providing that he is not offered the Senate seat vacant by the death of Hon. George Bradbury. "The biggest surprise of the campaign will, however, probably be found to be in Marquette where Hon. T. A. Crerar, will, it is understood, not accept re-nomination. Mr. Crerar has found it necessary to devote the greater part of the past two years to his business as the head of the United Grain Growers, and a result will disappear for a time at least from western and federal politics. "R. A. Hoey, Progressive, Springfield, will definitely not be a candidate. It is learned that he has been turned away from politics by an attractive offer from a western business organization."

ASSERTS THE KING GOVERNMENT LACKS POLICY; AND TERMS IT FEEBLE AND FUTILE

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative Leader Declares Half Million Left Canada in Liberal Regime Because They Sought Work—Calls Protection Only Solution.

WINGHAM, Ont., Sept. 10.—In the course of his speech at Wingham, the Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Conservative party, went on as follows: "You ask what I would do, he said, referring to the railway situation. 'I will tell you, I will stop these new capital investments with a strong hand the first month I am in power. There will be no more Scribner Hotels, there will be no more skyscrapers on Yonge Street, there will be no more extravagant golf courses and radio systems, here, there and everywhere, there will be a determined effort to get the last dollar out of the property in a single sentence which declares to have, and not to have, obligations and troubles."

King Government Floundering On Question Of Tariff
But the basic underlying policy which must be adopted if Canada was to recover and grow the tariff on immediate revision of the tariff on a definite and consistently protective basis. This, Mr. Meighen declared, was fundamental. The railway problem was indirectly due to inadequate tariffs. Low duties of thousands of Canadian dollars, the best of our citizens, the finest of our workmen, the flower of our homes." And Mr. King and his Government had "feebly fumbled and floundered" on the great question.

Where King Got His Majority.
"This method of showing that Mr. King's government had gained in public confidence which was characteristic of the Prime Minister, "Why" he said, "when parliament opened we had only a majority of one and with the speaker in the chair we had none at all." "Now," he declared, "we have a majority of one even with the speaker in the chair! Everybody in Canada knows why he has that majority of one. His Party instead of having more members elected by the people as has been the case with the Conservative party, Mr. King has a majority of one because two counterfactual Progressives Mr. Hammel of Huskoka and Mr. Binnett of Prescott, abandoned the Progressives whom they were elected to

Senator Donnelly stressed the importance of an independent Senate, and declared his belief that Senators Bursaw, Murphy and Bennett would not accept any agreement binding them to Senate reform.

Referring to the Australian treaty, Mr. Meighen charged that the Government had sacrificed the Canadian farmer in order to gain a market for the Canadian paper manufacturer.

Most Feeble And Futile Government Canada Has Yet Endured.
Mr. Meighen opened his speech as follows: "This meeting was arranged some two weeks ago but I reason of the fact that an election has been announced it becomes in a sense the first Conservative meeting of the campaign. For four years we have been assured times without number the Prime Minister, Mr. Mackenzie King that his government was dealing in a mastery way with the nation's problems, or if not dealing with them was just about to start to deal with them, and was supported in the House of Commons by large majorities of what he described as men of Liberal thought. On Saturday last, however, he got a lot nearer the truth and in a long oration in North York, he confessed to the people of Canada that they could not deal with the problems of the nation at all and the only reason he could give was that they did not have a sufficient majority in the House of Commons. For that reason, he said, there must be an election. The whole country is relieved because there has at last come to an end the most serious and the most deplorable situation that has ever known and the people of Canada are relieved still more because they feel themselves close to the end of the most feeble and futile government this Dominion has yet been called on to endure.

Canadian Farmer Sacrificed By Present Liberal Government.
Mr. Lyons advocated a protective tariff policy. Canada was exporting nickel, copper, asbestos, wood pulp in the raw form. If these were manufactured here an addition of \$400,000,000 worth of thousands would find employment and the market for farmers would be enlarged.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 10.—Shaping plans for settlement next year of 325,000 acres of land in Alberta and Saskatchewan, directors of the Dominion Lands Settlement Corporation, left here for the west tonight in company with Major-General Hon. Sir Newton James Moore, K.C.M.G., vice-chairman of the corporation.

On the return from the inspection trip the directors state they will be prepared to make a definite statement on the proposed work for the coming year.

Hope Is Abandoned For Missing Airmen

(Canadian Press.)
PARIS, Sept. 10.—Hope has been abandoned for the French airmen Fernand Laporte and Henri Priha, and their three assistants who were lost at sea Sunday in a hydro plane between the south coast of France and the coast of Corsica. A search for the missing men has ceased.

Immigrants Total 32,449 in 3 Months

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—Immigration to Canada for the first three months of the present fiscal year, that is from April 1st to June 30th, 1925, totalled 32,449, according to a report issued by the Department of Immigration last night.

Of this total, 15,894 came from Great Britain, Northern Ireland and the Irish Free State; 5,307 from the United States, and 11,048 from other countries, almost entirely from Northern Europe.

In the same three months, 9,141 Canadiana who had been in the United States for six months or longer and who were to the country to settle, returned to the Dominion. Since the department of Immigration and Colonization began to keep a record of these returning Canadiana on April 1st, 1924, a total of 52,916 had come back up to the end of last June.

Money Is Plentiful In Canada, But Will Speak Here Friday, Sept. 18th.

(Special to The Guardian.)
TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 10.—Money is plentiful in Canada at the present time according to Sir Herbert Holt, President of the Royal Bank, who came to Toronto today with fellow directors of the C. P. R., but the difficulty, he says, is to get satisfactory investments.

There is also a very large quantity of capital from the U. S., but hardly any British capital coming in. Manitoba's capital debt has been reduced \$500,000 through consolidation of bond issues which fell due last month.

Auto Hits By Train At New Annan

(Special to The Guardian.)
SUMMERSIDE, Sept. 10.—Last evening the car of Mr. D. M. Johnstone, Long River (number 5105) and driven by his son Mr. David Johnstone was struck by the R. C. train at Tupper's crossing.

New Annan, neither the railway or the Motor League have any sign at this crossing, which is a most dangerous one, and 50 yards from the view of an on-coming train.

About 8.20 the car containing Messrs David Johnstone, Long River; Harold Moase, New Annan; and Harold Campbell, Long River, were driving from Summerside to their home, and on account of the woods they were practically right upon the train before they saw it. They applied their brakes, but the centre of the train struck them (the steps of the train wrecking the front of the car, but fortunately not injuring any of the occupants) the men in the car say they did not hear the train blowing. This is a very dangerous crossing and the railway should place signs on it for the safety of autoists and motorists. Another point to be impressed upon autoists as a result of this accident is the absolute necessity of always having breaks in proper working order.

The Provincial Government's auto inspector was at the scene of the accident immediately after it occurred.

CON'S LEADER RECEIVES BIG WELCOME

BETHANY, Ont., Sept. 10.—After a trip by motor about 150 miles from Wingham where he opened his campaign yesterday, to Toronto where he spent the night, Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative Leader, arrived in this little Durham County village. This afternoon he again addressed electors in an appeal for their support, following the main lines laid down at Wingham. The leader of the Conservative Party received a welcome here when he arrived by motor from Bowmanville, accompanied by W. Bowen, Conservative member for Durham. With him was Hon. R. J. Manion of Fort William.

France Must Be Reasonable, Says Premier Painleve

MULHOUSE, France, Sept. 10.—Speaking at a reception tendered him by the municipality of Mulhouse last evening, Premier Painleve, dealing with the question of Inter-Allied debts said that France must not enter into engagements which she knows she could not fulfill, and said the country asked for an equitable and accurate appreciation of its capacity to pay.

Premier Veniot Of N. B. Resigns Today

(Canadian Press.)
FREDERICTON, Sept. 10.—The resignation of Hon. P. J. Veniot, Premier of New Brunswick and his administration, the sixteenth in this Province since Confederation, is not to be effective today as was generally expected.

Premier Veniot who was at his office at the Provincial Building today clearing up the business of his administration finally revealed this morning that his sealed resignation handed to Lieut. Governor Todd before he left last Saturday for Quebec does not get into effect until tomorrow, September 11th.

League Assembly Applauds Chamberlain

GENEVA, Sept. 10.—Addressing the Assembly of the League of Nations today British Foreign Secretary Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain aroused applause at the very outset when he declared there had been a distinct growth in international interest in the League and what was more important a distinct growth in the League's authority.

High Shoes Back

LONDON, Sept. 10.—High shoes for women after having been in banishment for eleven years again will be in fashion on the streets of London this winter. Shoes will be highly colored leathers and snake and crocodile skins.

Trafalgar Square Jars U. S. Sculptor

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Trafalgar square, which carries all sentiments of pride of home to far-away Englishmen, is only an unholy mess that jars the aesthetic senses of Jacob Epstein, the United States sculptor.

Defending his last creation, the memorial to W. H. Hudson, the famous naturalist and writer, who died in London in 1922, which has been widely criticized adversely, Mr. Epstein in an interview says: "There are hardly any good statues in London. Look at that fearful concoction in front of Buckingham Palace. It is so big that one cannot avoid seeing it."

"Look at Trafalgar Square—what an unholy mess. It is the worst square in the world. Think of that column in the middle carrying a puny figure of Nelson, which is out of proportion, and cannot be seen."

\$124,833 Footwear Purchased In U. S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Imports of leather footwear from the United States into Canada during the month of July, amounted to 58,022 pairs, valued at \$124,833, which constitutes a slight decrease when compared with May and June.

According to a government compilation, the United States supplied 20 per cent. of the leather footwear for men in Canada, 60.5 per cent. of that for women and 19 per cent. of that for children.

C. P. R. President Does Not Agree With the Premier

(Special to The Guardian.)
TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 10.—E. W. Beatty, K.C., President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, accompanied by Grant Hall, First Vice-President and A. D. Mactier, Vice-President of eastern lines and several C. P. R. directors, visited Toronto today, and was the principal speaker at the exhibition luncheon. Mr. Beatty declared that the intervention of a third party was not necessary to carry out the policy of coordination, announced by Premier King. Mr. Beatty also expressed the opinion that railway rates evolved and discussed in the cross currents and hectic atmosphere of a general election, would not receive the sober consideration they deserve.

Charge Of Negligence In Air To Be Probed By United States

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Proceedings were initiated yesterday the war department to call Col. William Mitchell to account for his public declaration that administration of the army and navy air service had been criminally negligent, "and almost treasonable."

Col. G. A. Nugent was instructed to proceed to San Antonio, Texas, today where Col. Mitchell is stationed, to ask him in person if he did make the statement attributed to him in published articles.

Since it is not doubted at the department that Col. Mitchell will admit having made the statements under investigations, the preliminary move is merely a necessary routine step, paving the way possibly for trial by an army court.

U. S. Wheat Yield

(Canadian Press.)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The wheat yield of the United States this year is placed at thirteen bushels an acre by Department of Agriculture. Last year's yield was 18.1 bushels. The average, this year was only four tenths of one percent smaller than last year, but owing to the reduced acre yield this year's crop is forecast at 700,000,000 bushels, while last year's total was 873,000,000 bushels.

Murderess Insane

PARIS, Sept. 10.—Marie Bonnevoy, the woman who on May 26 shot and killed Ernest Berger, treasurer of the French Royalist League of Action, has been judged insane by the investigating magistrates and unfit to stand trial.

The woman shot Berger mistaking him for Charles Maurras one of the editors of the Royalist newspaper, L'Action Francaise. She is a domestic servant, about 45 years of age.

Gets Appointment

(Canadian Press.)
WINNIPEG, Sept. 10.—The appointment of R. A. Hoey, M. P. for Springfield to the position of Assistant Director of the newly formed Department of Publicity and Education of the Manitoba Pool was announced here today. Mr. Hoey's withdrawal from political life was foreshadowed in a Canadian Press despatch yesterday.

Negroes Shot Two White Men In Detroit

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 10.—Leon Briener was shot and killed, and Eric Houghberg was shot and seriously injured in a riot in the residential section here tonight. The trouble started when a negro family moved into a section previously inhabited only by white persons. The men shot were white.

Police reserves were called to the house last night, when missiles were thrown through the windows in an effort to force the negroes to vacate. The negroes determined to hold the property, and tonight a crowd estimated at several thousand persons gathered at the house.

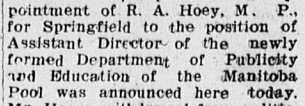
According to witnesses, the crowd estimated at several thousand persons gathered at the house. According to witnesses, the crowd tonight made no attempt to infringe the property, but the negroes, seeing the persons outside, opened fire. Both of the men struck by bullets lived in the block in which the house is located.

Houghberg told police that he was walking past the house and was not in the mob that apparently provoked the negroes' attack. When police arrived they found the house packed with negroes. They were arrested.

The house was occupied by Dr. Oslan H. Sweet, an interne at a negro hospital. They said they saw the crowd in front of the house, and fearing it would be attacked, opened fire to frighten the mob.
