Approved Flock Policy For P. E. Island

Foreword

The problem which now confronts this province is one of increased and economic production. Prince Edward Island possesses some of the best foundation stock to be found anywhere, and the vigor of the flock is doubtful if it can be surpassed on this continent. In order to increase and distribute this foundation stock in the most efficient manner, the Prince Edward Island Approved Flock Policy is being inaugurated. The functions of the policy, stated briefly, are as follows: 1. To secure flocks of a dual purpose strain or poultry which will produce a respectable quantity of eggs and at the same time develop into a desirable dressed poultry market bird, from which these wishing to improve their flocks can secure hatching eggs or breeding stock. 2. To secure flocks to supply Government Approved Hatcheries with eggs. 3. To create community interest in poultry keeping which will strengthen the industry and bring farm poultry to the status which our domestic conditions warrant. 4. The Prince Edward Island Approved Flock Policy is to apply only to Barred Plymouth Rocks, being breeds Reg. New Hampshire Reds, White Wyandottes, Light Sussex, and Single Comb White Leghorns, for the following reasons: (a) They are the most popular of the utility breeds, and well suited to farm conditions. (b) Agricultural Colleges and Experimental Farms have recognized them as such, and have done more breeding work to develop laying strains than with any other breed, as a consequence of which a supply of high line breeding stock is more readily available.

Rules and Regulations

Under the Prince Edward Island Approved Flock Policy the breeder enters into an agreement with the Provincial Dept. of Agriculture through the Poultry Representative as follows: (1) To place the details of the breeding of his or her flock under the direction of the Island Poultry Inspector at Charlottetown. (2) To use for breeding purposes approved males with known production record, behind them, which have been selected, and to use them only. (3) To carry only selected or approved breeding stock on the farm, which has been recorded in the pullover, and to breed from these only. (4) To incubate only eggs which weigh at least 24 oz. to the dozen, which are sound and smooth in shell, good shape, free from wrinkles and other defects. (5) To have all chicks hatched prior to May 20th and to use artificial means for hatching and brooding. (6) To rear all chickens apart from adult stock, and on clean land. (7) To disinfect thoroughly the poultry house previous to housing pullets. (8) To allow the flock to be culled or poor layers or other undesirable birds at any time deemed advisable. (9) To provide at the end of each month, on forms supplied, a statement of the daily production of the flock, feed records, mortality, and such information as required. (10) To adopt any reasonable measure suggested for improving the conditions of housing, care and management of the flock. (11) Poultry house to have either cement or double board floor, dropping boards, suitable feed hoppers, water utensils and nests; arranged for adequate light and ventilation. (12) To feed a balanced laying mash, and this to be substituted by breeder mash during breeding period. (13) To adopt necessary measures to keep the flock free from disease. (14) Only birds approved by the Inspector kept on premises. (15) All pullover records to be moved from flock to flock. (16) Application for flock approval to be made previous to August 1st each year. Non-adherence to the above rules will automatically cancel membership in the Prince Edward Island Approved Flock Policy. In return for the faithful observance of the Rules and regulations governing the P. E. I. Approved Flocks on the breeder's part the Department of Agriculture will: (1) To select a breeding pen of the highest producing females prior to the hatching season, and to band all birds passing inspection with P. E. I. Approved Flock steel bands, free of charge. (2) To select from the flock, or procure elsewhere, suitable and sufficient male birds to mate with the approved females. (3) To publish a list twice yearly of the breeders having desirable breeding stock, hatching eggs, or day old chicks for sale. (4) To cull the flock, during the summer or autumn months of its low and unprofitable production. (5) To take blood samples of all birds under the Policy. The taking of blood samples to be free of charge, breeder pays for testing blood by private pathologist. (6) To provide free of charge all forms on which reports are to be made. (7) To render any other possible assistance to insure profitable production from the flocks. (8) All flocks qualifying under this Policy are eligible to supply hatching eggs to Government Approved Hatcheries. (9) The Department retains the right to cancel any membership due to failure to abide by rules. Mayor Frank Scholes of Radcliffe, Eng. has been invited by members of the P. E. I. to be the official officer for another year.
