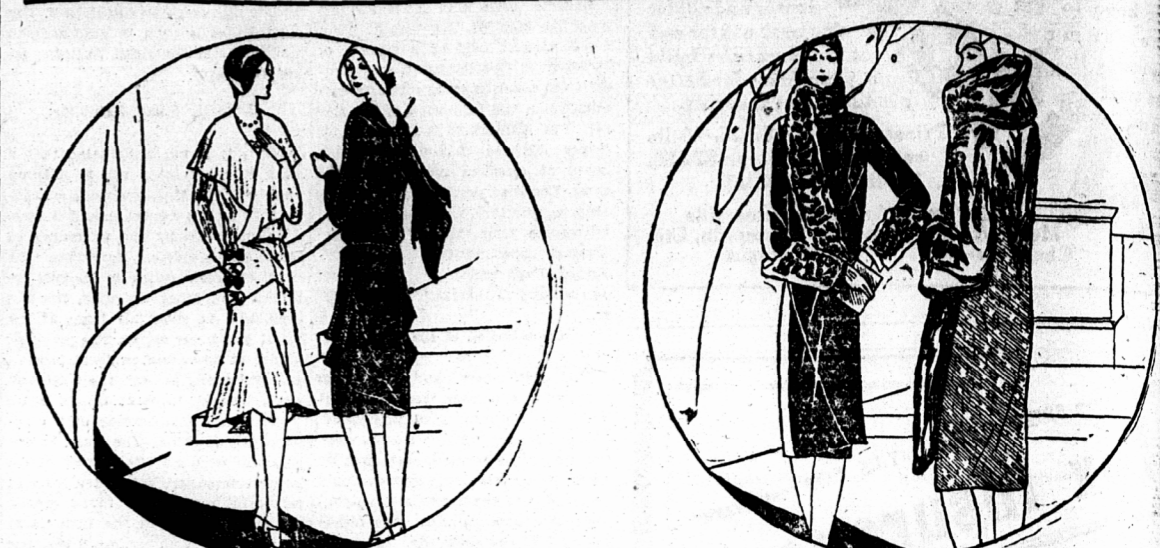

PARIS RETURNS TO PEACE
TIME FORTIFICATIONS
PARIS, October 26.—Paris, the goal of many an invading army since the time of Caesar, has not only done away with the three rings of fortifications that encircled her before the war, but has greatly decreased the troops that once were on constant peace-time duty within her walls. Before the war the garrison of Paris counted twenty thousand bayonets and four thousand sabres, with the artillery, the engineers and supplementary services bringing the number of men above 25,000. Today only 2,500 poilus are on duty in the capital.

Whenever the peace of the city seems menaced, troops are brought in from the province by rail—a hundred men from one town, two hundred from another, and so on. Twice this year the army has brought battalions to Paris from the country to be ready to aid the police. The first occasion was on May Day, when trouble from the Communists was feared. The second time was August 1, for exactly the same reason. Nothing happened on either day. The troops, for the most part, were kept in the suburbs. It is outside the walls of the city that future troubles, if they come, are likely to be started. The industrial revolution, the housing crisis since the war and other

modern developments connected with the growth of Paris itself have brought about a migration from inside the city to its suburbs of a goodly portion of the proletariat. The descendants of the revolutionaries who stormed the Bastille in 1789 and the Rue de Rivoli during the Commune of 1871 are living in great numbers these days, not in Paris itself, but in the industrial centers surrounding the capital.
