REGISTRAR SIGNED CERTIFICATE
 "He (Henderson, retired Farrisboro shipper registrar) signed the certificate in my presence; I can see him as plainly as I did then." This was the prompt answer of witness on the question of the disputed certificate of ownership by Hatfield of the vessel. This document became lost. In the meantime, he filed a copy with the reparations commissioner. The second original, later filed by the Senator with the commissioner, had been obtained after he had notified Henderson by telephone of the loss of the first document, said witness. "And he (Henderson) signed it the same way again in my presence dragging his hand across the table," swore the Senator as he raised his voice in emphasis.
