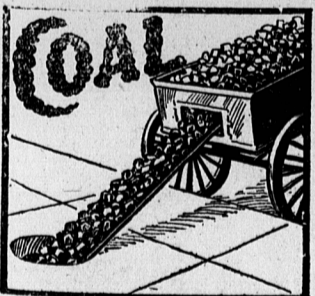

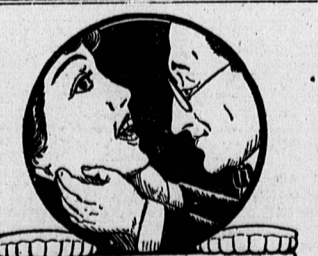

The Guardian has received from W. C. Collett, of Boston, formerly of this Province, copies of the Indianapolis Star, Ind., containing graphic accounts of the annual Sovereign Grand Lodge meeting of the I. O. O. F., now being held in that city. Mr. Collett who is high up in the order takes an active part in the different committees. It is estimated that there are about 30,000 visitors in attendance.

Miss Josie Peebles, City, leaves this morning for Winnipeg where she will be married on Wednesday next to Henry Jenkins, of Calgary, formerly of this city. The young couple, after their marriage will take up their residence in Calgary. Miss Peebles received from her friends here a large accumulation of gifts, amply testifying to her popularity. She will be accompanied by the best of wishes of a very large number of friends of the young couple who are so widely and favorably known here.

In connection with the Federal Election there were the usual predictions. From the party papers in different sections of the Dominion it was interesting to note the division forecasted in Prince Edward Island. Liberals, 4; Conservatives, 0, was a favorite with the Liberal journals while the Conservative press were fond of reversing the order in the numericals. Others gave 3-1 for either side seemingly more according to past view than to actual consideration of the situation, while it remained for the Frederick N. B. Gleason, to quote a forecast which turned out correct, their prediction being 2-2.

Many here will be interested in the following from a Toronto Exchange:—Rev. Jas. Chapman of Battersea, London, one of the secretaries of the eastern section of the Ecumenical conference of the Methodist Church which opens in this city on the fourth of October, has arrived in Toronto. He is accompanied by his son J. C. Chapman, who is also a delegate. The ecumenical conference, it is claimed, will be the greatest church convention that has ever been held in Toronto because it is to have representatives from all parts of the globe. Next Thursday the secretary for the United States will arrive when preparations for the convention will be completed. During the council the Christian Guardian, the Methodist Weekly paper, is to have a daily issue in order that those interested may have a detailed account of the proceedings of the conference day by day. (There will be a delegate from this Province to the Ecumenical Conference.)

In St. Peter's Cathedral, London, Ont., the marriage took place yesterday afternoon of Miss Marguerite Ginge, only daughter of Mrs. John H. Ginge, of London, Ont., to Captain William Edgar Pope, second son of Joseph Pope, second son of Joseph and Mrs. Pope of Ottawa, Under Secretary of State, and grandson of the late Chief Justice, Sir Henri Taschereau, of Montreal. The marriage was performed by Monseigneur Alyward, only immediate relatives being present. The bride was gowned in white satin, with a long veil, and she carried a bouquet of white flowers. The bridesmaid was Miss Gibbons, daughter of Sir George C. Gibbons, and the best man was Lieut. H. S. R. Griffith, of London, England, who is stationed at Wolseley Barracks, London, Ont. A reception was held after the ceremony at the residence of the bride's mother. The bridegroom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pope, of Ottawa, were among the guests. Captain and Mrs. Pope are spending a part of their honeymoon in Montreal. They will make their home in Quebec.—Montreal Exc. (The groom is well known here.)
