WILLIAMS' ADMISION.

He is Sad to Have Confessed That He Intended Robbery.

It is stated on what appears to be excellent authority, that Alfred C. Williams, in Salem jail under sentence of death for killing John Gullo at Lynnhaven, has made a statement, which, however, will not be made public at present.

It is understood that he admits that he entered Gullo's hut for the purpose of robbery, and that Gullo awakened, closed with him and a fight ensued.

This statement, if it is ever made public, will probably clear up the mystery surrounding the murder.

Counsel still hope for the intervention of the supreme court, and if a new trial were ordered it is probable Williams would plead guilty of murder in the second degree, which he declined to do before, although it is understood that the government was willing to accept such a plea at that time.

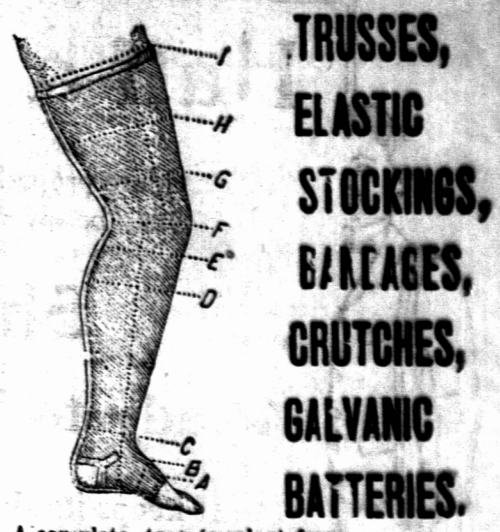
