FAR EASTERN NOTES—After the long and severe winter, the amount of open water to be seen about East Point is something remarkable, the more so as there is not in the lakes north or south a spot of open water in which a goose could swim. The wild geese have arrived but like the Nor-omen of old they "waited for the open sea."—Fred Stewart in partnership with Pearce & McDonald have taken a contract to raise and launch the Schr. Citizen, stranded at Black Point. The young men have a heavy job on hand and they certainly deserve to succeed. In making another effort to float this fine vessel Mr. Kiekhham has shown remarkable determination, and his many friends will wish him better luck this time.—The mysterious lights which for many years have been seen on the ice between East Point and Cape Breton have lately been in their old position. It is a strange affair and remains as it has always been, shrouded in mystery. Only sealers were ever known to travel over the ice in this direction, and there were none in the Gulf on any occasion when a light or lights were seen in years past, and it is safe to say there were none there the middle of March when a light was seen to travel in a westerly direction not far from shore, the straits being then jammed with ice. In the autumn months it is often seen in the open Gulf between North Cape and Bay Chaleur and also on banks Bradley and Orphan. A good many years ago the Miramichi Gleaner devoted an editorial to the affair in which it was not inaptly called the "Mystery of the St. Lawrence." Sometimes it looks like a ship on fire; at other times it appears like a luminous haze, as if the main body of the light were below the horizon. American skippers have often run for it, but never seemed to get nearer than when starting. Probably it will ever remain as it has always been the mystery of the St. Lawrence.—From present appearances we are in for a very late spring; and it happens well that feed for cattle is plenty. Old people tell me they have seen good carting here in March. At present the sleighing is perfect and wheels may not be seen in April.—Farmers in this direction are pleased to learn that the proprietor of Boshwell Mills intends during the coming summer to refit for manufacturing oatmeal. Owing to illness Mr. McVane gave up that branch of his business two years ago. He is considered second to none in that line, and as his is the only mill in several of the Eastern Townships fitted up for handling oats, it is pleasing to know that the business which for forty odd years was conducted with so much satisfaction to the public, is to be started up again.—Eastern people cannot understand how it happens that the Postmaster General is selling for tenders for a daily mail from Souris to East Point and to continue around the North Side and through Souris L'ice Road to the place of commencement. If carried out the North Side people will have a good chance to study ancient literature especially when the "circular route" is blocked up with snow.
