ADMITS MURDERER MAY BE INSANE

The Slayer of Architect White Says Latter Ruined His Home—Has Aristocratic Connections—His Council will Put Forward a Plea of Insanity.

New York, June 26 (Special)—Frankly admitting that he killed Stanford White, the famous architect and pleading in justification of the deed that White had ruined the life of his wife, the beautiful former chorus girl and artist's model, Florence Evelyn Nostlitt, Harry Kendall Thaw of Pittsburg, brother of the Countess of Yarnmouth, occupies a cell in the Tombs awaiting the action of the grand jury on a charge of murder.

WITH THE MEN AT CAMP BRIGHTON

Some Details of The Daily Routine to Be Followed While in Camp

There are now encamped in Victoria Park, the headquarters staff, as already published in The Guardian, the Army Medical Corps, 80 strong, under command of Colonel Johnson and Major McLaughlin; No. 3 Company of the Fourth Regiment Royal Canadian Artillery, composed of the left half company from Montague, 32 strong, and the right half company from Souris 51 strong.

No. 1, Charlottetown, Capt. A. J. B. Mellich. Lieuts. Tidmarsh, McKee, and McNutt. No. 2, Pownal, Capt. Jones. No. 3, Summerside, Capt. Enman, Lieuts. A Brennan, Squarebriggs, and V O Brennan. No. 4, Capt. Hardy, Lieuts Duck and Crockett. No. 5, Hunter River, Capt. Dark. No. 6, Covehead, Capt. M A Shaw, Lieuts. McMillan and Blue.

Notwithstanding the wet weather prior to pitching their tents, the men are fairly comfortable, the fine afternoon yesterday doing much to dry up the ground. The camp in the park is pitched in a delightful place and the scene is one that for natural beauty would be hard to equal.

There will be a muster parade to-day at 9 a. m. taken part in by the 4th Regiment C. A. and the 8th Battalion, and No. 9 Field Ambulance Corps and the Signalling Corps, on the parade ground at the Park.

There will also be a muster of the Light Horse at their own grounds. A new feature of interest added this year is the signalling corps. This consists of a nucleus of six signallers under command of Lieut. W. K. Rogers, D. S. O., and instruction will be by them imparted to about 20 men drawn from other units in camp.

There will be a grand church parade on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, to St. Paul's Church, at which all the troops in camp and Charlottetown will turn out.

ARCTIC REPORT EXONERATES ALL

Says Ship Was Not Overmanned or Over-supplied, Her Stores Reasonable and None Were Diverted to Other than Proper Uses—Mr. Bennet Dissents.

OTTAWA, June 26 (Special)—The Committee appointed to investigate the expenditures in connection with the steamer Arctic prepared their report today for presentation to parliament tomorrow. The report sets forth that the Arctic was not over provisioned nor over manned and that in view of the hardships to be encountered her provisions were not over expensive, but the ship's stores were reasonable and necessary.

There was one criminal charge. The King vs. Haynes, indecent assault, in which the Grand Jury found no bill and the defendant was discharged. In the cases of Frank R. Heartz vs. J. M. Foley and the Lawton Saw Co. vs. James C. Ferguson both actions for debt, judgment by consent was given for the plaintiffs.

The chief case on the Civil docket was Frottingham and Workman vs. R. B. Norton & Co. WOMAN'S HEROISM TO SAVE LIFE

CALGARY, June 26 (Special)—Further details of a double tragedy in Red Deer River district indicate most heroic conduct on the part of Mrs Bond of Seckelma and an effort is to be made to have the woman's heroism recognised.

Mrs Bond, with Mrs Lamarche and her little girl, was fording Little Red Deer River when the water swept the wagon box away. Mrs Bond clung to the wagon box and though herself in extreme peril started to rescue Mrs Lamarche. She got the woman in the wagon box and the two floated down stream two miles before Mrs. Bond could wade to shore. When she did it was to find that Mrs. Lamarche was dead. Mrs. Lamarche's little daughter was also drowned.
