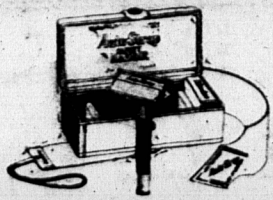

**M. C. McLure Back From The U. S.**

will produce high grade skins you need not fear overproduction. The reason that your prices are low is because you are producing less high grade skins according to the quantity in general."

Mr. McLure also interviewed several French buyers and they all concur in the opinion that we should make known our product, and see that our skins are of the highest quality.

On being asked by the reporter about what was the best grade of skins for the market, Mr. McLure stated that as a report would be given to the Fox Breeders' Association at their meeting, he would not describe the best types to market, but would leave that to give to the meeting.

Mr. McLure on being asked what is the value of the industry to the province this year, said: "I cannot say what the value is to the Island as you are aware the marketing of the product is so divided that one cannot but make an approximate estimate, but I will say this, that if our people want to they can within the next five years bring to this Province annually over two million dollars for our raw furs. This year I would judge that over seven hundred thousand dollars would be the revenue."

Conditions in general lines of trade of the fur industry are exceptionally good in America, Mr. McLure added, and unless some great crisis intervenes it looks today as if the market will remain firm, and steady. The money is there and it is only a matter for us to get our share of it for our product. On the whole we have a standing today in the market that four years ago one could hardly believe we could open up to such proportions with our article. We hope to have still better results in the future, as the attention of the great furriers of the world are gradually being drawn to our wonderful product.

**Lively Fighting In Smyrna**

turn to Canada if a good opportunity is given.

The Minister replied the government had under consideration plans for bringing back Canadians, but at the present time it was necessary to maintain the department of immigration. Mr. Lemieux said the papers stated that a large number of Europeans are leaving the United States to return to Europe. He should like to know if there was any similar exodus from Canada. If so he thought it better to keep here men who are already familiar with Canadian affairs than pay money to bring in new settlers.

Mr. MacKenzie said the government did not even know what lands were available for settlers.

Mr. Calder replied that was true of the province of Nova Scotia.

Mr. MacKenzie replied that Nova Scotia had no available land and did not seek government aid in the matter of immigration. Good progress was made with estimates.

Hon. G. D. Robertson, Minister of Labor, leaves tonight for Winnipeg. This decision was reached at the cabinet council in the House at the opening this afternoon.

Mr. MacLean made an official announcement that the government realized the seriousness of the situation, but had no additional information. Bakers aid milkmen are carrying on business today. Restaurants are open to the public with certain limitations. The Minister of Labor considers the situation could not have been helped by his earlier departure for Winnipeg.

Press telegraphers are on strike, but Mr. Reviens, who appears to be the Labor Leader, agrees to permit a certain amount of press copy to go forward each day, providing it is submitted to the Labor censors and passed by them. Some newspapers today got a special service from correspondents who telephoned news from Winnipeg to a point across the United States border, and filed it there.

There has been no more rioting, and the city passed a peaceful night. Employees of the Government Railways met and decided they would go out as soon as called. Employees of the C. P. R. will meet later to take a strike vote. It is expected they will join. This development will completely isolate Winnipeg from the outside world. No troops have yet been sent in, though a Toronto battalion has been warned to be in readiness to go.

Brandon union men also voted to strike in sympathy with Winnipeg if such development is required.

**WORTHY OF THOUGHT**

(From the Canadian Courier.)  
It is gratifying to know that Canada leads in the work of rehabilitating returned soldiers. In this the soldiers must help the employer—and vice versa. It is not necessary that returned men should go peddling slings and adhesive tape. Every employer should make room for a returned man whenever possible. Many employers are doing it. There are hundreds of women in homes who want maids, willing to pay good wages, and can't get them; thousands of girls who are holding men's jobs and keep the men out on the street. Some of these women are running elevators. The Labor Department should take a census of all women employed everywhere. As long as homes are destitute of needed domestic help and men walk the streets looking for jobs we shall have to consider the advisability of taking returned men into the kitchens—where without doubt many of them, would soon be more efficient than the average maid of recent years. The employer who refuses to pay the difference between a girl's wages and a returned soldier's, and the returned man who wants a job but doesn't want to work at it, are both queering the game for other people.
