## Asks Question

"The Independent Labor party, therefore, while unreservedly condemning the method of the recent political assassination deplores the fact that the British Government should have made this crime the occasion for asserting new imperialistic claims which may virtually amount to the annexation of the Sudan and the appropriation of the water supplies from the Nile to the detriment of Egypt and to the advantage of the British cotton companies.

"The Independent Labor party urges that the issue of control of the Sudan should be submitted to the League of Nations with the view of developing that country as a self-governing nation at the earliest possible moment. It calls for an immediate Anglo-Egyptian conference to complete the evacuation of Egypt and to arrange for the submission of the question of the Suez Canal to the League, not as an issue in respect to which the British claim legal or moral authority, but as concerned with one of the international waterways of the world."

LONDON, Nov. 26.—A Reuter's despatch from Cairo stated that after Premier Ziwir had read the adjournment decree in Parliament today the members quietly dispersed. A quarter of an hour later it was stated, the Parliament building and the adjacent streets were deserted save for a few passers-by.

the first by a sort of Monroe Doctrine, safeguarding specific British interests, such as that which safeguards American interests in Cuba.

The Daily Telegraph remarks that, if the new Geneva protocol had been operative and ratified by Great Britain, the position would have been different and the question of indemnity would have been the subject of compulsory arbitration. "Indeed" it adds "if carried to its logical conclusion in practice, the protocol would have infringed the Monroe Doctrine. American critics of our action in Egypt should not discountain points."

The Daily Mail denounces the suggestion of submitting the affair to the League as "audacious" and "absurd" adding: "What happens in Egypt is the domestic concern of the British Empire, which is not prepared to allow any outside interference."

Commenting in a similar vein, the Daily Express says: "If any member of the League attempts to submit the matter to it as a subject for arbitration it will sound the death knell of the League."

It is noteworthy that the Laborite and a section of Liberal opinion here continue to insist strongly that the case should be put before the League.
