Illustration Station operators in Prince Edward Island gathered in a substantial share of the prizes in the Field Crop classes at the recent Maritime Winter Fair, states E. L. Eaton, of Charlottetown, Supervisor of Illustration Stations for P. E. I. In the Field Crop Division, 29 entries were received from New Brunswick, 32 from Prince Edward Island, and 124 from Nova Scotia, a total of 185 entries. Thirteen entries were made by the Illustration Station operators of Prince Edward Island and nine placings were won as follows: Lester and Heber Proffitt, Rosebank, received first on Early Blue peas, second on early wheat and fourth on late wheat. T. A. Hicken, Alliston, took first on collection of registered wheat, oats and barley, also a fourth on barley, fourth on wheat and sixth on oats. W. E. Johnson, New London, was first in purple top swedes with Hector MacKay, DeSable, second and J. L. Clark, Rustico, sixth in the same section.

**"Our People"**

"Why don't you do something for your own Canadian people, instead of worrying us about China, a foreign nation?" This question was put to a canvasser for help, medical and ambulance, needed to save Chinese civilians, fallen by the wayside. His answer: "Should we call the Chinese foreigners, especially in Victoria and Vancouver? In any case they are God's people, same as you and I are. When one thinks what their courageous stand for the past 16 months has done to preserve the thing called freedom in a decadent world, not for China only, but for other nations better armed, but with little faith of little courage, one can scarcely have the face to refuse what little help he is allowed to give. Patriotism is not enough; 'My people' are the people of this wide world." "So many men are worrying themselves over their own affairs into untimely graves; but it is cheering to remember that here and there, some great unselfish soul foretells himself into immortality. Kwun Fu-tze (Confucius) has been for 2,000 years among the immortals; the name Chiang Kai-shek must soon be added to that illustrious roll of men 'never to be forgotten.'" "Petty fears of loss of property, of prestige; selfish fears, seeking safety for oneself, one's family, one's country, at the cost of others, and the general dread of the horrors of war, are not enough. Not that way can we get permanent peace. There must be the will, individual and national, to sacrifice pleasure, property, life itself, so that justice, faith, freedom and truth may continue on the earth. The fear of destruction must become the will for construction. . . . So runs the word at the Hague. But Holland took little part with the fighters for freedom in the Great War. And now again the world has been given its lessons at Munich, viz., that mere 'moral re-armament,' unless backed by the ability and the will to fight, count for little in
