MINISTERIAL CALLS ACCEPTED

At the Presbytery Meeting Yesterday Afternoon

Rev. Edwin Smith, the Popular Pastor at Kensington will go to Cardigan.

Presbytery opened at half past two the Moderator Rev. A. D. McDonald Hampton, in the chair.

On motion of Rev. T. F. Fullerton, Rev. Roland Davidson was appointed interim moderator of Bloomfield O'Leary and Brae in place of Rev. H. G. Gratz who is now moderator of Tignish.

Mr. Harris, Cardigan appeared on behalf of a very hearty call to Rev. Edwin Smith, Kensington to Cardigan.

Rev. R. G. Sinclair, Montague supported Mr. Harris on behalf of the call.

Mr. Brown and Mr. Johnson appeared on behalf of Mr. Smith's congregation making a strong plea that the change be not made.

Rev. Edwin Smith thanked the commissioners for their kind words. He referred to his work in his present circuit and accepted the call to Cardigan.

A resolution congratulating Rev. J. M. McLeod on his jubilee was sustained and ordered to be forwarded.

Rev. W. H. Smith submitted a well supported call from Richmond Bay East to Rev. W. A. Mason. The call was sustained and placed in the hands of Mr. Mason who accepted it.

Induction was placed for Tuesday Nov. 17th in Port Hill Church at half past one o'clock.

On behalf of the Presbytery Fund Committee Rev. E. Smith reported that a fund made up of one per cent of each minister's salary be levied on each congregation and collections at each induction and public meetings be set aside as a Presbytery fund to pay the clerk's travelling expenses etc.

SUPREME COURT.

Thursday, Nov. 3.

The Michaelmas term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday, the three judges presiding.

Irving B. Howatt, B. A., of French River was on application of J. A. Mathies admitted as a student at law in the office of A. A. McLean, K. C.

James McEachern vs. James R. McLean, action of debt. The case was tried in Georgetown last July term, when judgment was reserved.

Thomas Kichan vs. John Davidson and Alfred Burke. Action to set aside a bill of sale. McLean, K.C. for the sheriff, Matheson for claimant, Stewart, K. C. and A. L. Fraser for plaintiff.

One point to be argued is as to whether the act relating to the assignment for the benefit of creditors refers to farmers or to merchants and traders only.

The Attorney General moved for an order to the Prothonotary to draw in open court an additional number of petit jurors to serve at the next ensuing November term, such jurors pursuant to the statute. Order granted.

IT DERIDES THE NAVY OF UNCLE SAM.

LONDON, Oct. 31.-A new and discordant note has been sounded by Russia in regard to the situation in Manchuria and Korea and the attitude of the United States.

The Novce Yremya, the official organ in St. Petersburg, is permitted to publish the following statement:-

"America's statesmen realize the approaching danger of collisions with transoceanic power, and therefore they are insisting upon the rapid enlargement of their navy. At present their navy, although considerable, is not large enough to attain the objects that may be desired, and the powers of the old world are not

compelled to reckon seriously with the United States. Their real force is not great. Only when they possess a navy that will command the oceans separating the old from the new world will the Americans be able not merely to proclaim their rights, but also to demand recognition of them. This will not be soon, and in the meantime the American demands and threats need no particularly alarm either Europe or Asia."

Wonder is expressed here that the Russian authorities allow this statement to be made so openly, and apparently they do not fear the effect upon the American people.
