ISLANDER MISSING

Mr Norman C. Stewart, Highbank, received the following sad message: Ottawa, Ont., November 14, 1940.

Norman Stewart, Highbank, P. E. I. The Minister of National Defence for Naval Affairs deeply regrets to inform you that your son Gunner E. Stewart, R. C. N. R. Ottawa No. 192 is missing believed killed in action, naval.

Gunner Stewart had spent a training period every year at the Navy Headquarters at Halifax for the past five or six years. At the outbreak of the war he was placed as a gunner on a passenger boat from Halifax to Bermuda, B. W. I.

He was then transferred to boats sailing to the British Islands. At the time of the unfortunate affair referred to in the telegram, he was a gunner on the freight steamer Beaverford on the way from Canada to Great Britain.

During the last week in October letters were received from him mailed at an Eastern Canadian Port. Having been in the Navy service so long he expected on the next trip to Canada to visit his home.

He was 32 years of age. He was a quiet, respectable young man, bright and intelligent and served his King and Country most faithfully.

This message brought sincere sorrow to all who knew and loved him and sincere sympathy is extended to his relatives.

When further information is received fuller particulars will be given in the press.

No Intention Of Disbanding C.O.T.C. Units

OTTAWA, Nov. 18—(CP)—Despite the newly announced policy of appointing officers in the Canadian army only from the ranks the Canadian Officers' Training Corps units will continue to function, the Defence Department announced in a statement today.

"Scope of C.O.T.C. units may be altered somewhat but there is no intention to disband them," the statement said. "On the contrary they will be integrated with the training system of the Canadian army as in the past."

Members of these training corps units now enter as cadets and undergo similar training to a recruit in a reserve unit. They are appointed to commissions only after qualification and the same procedure the department said, will continue in the future "except that the standard of qualification will be raised and a period of training with an officers' wing of an active training centre will be required."

In short, the statement added, "the training will be changed by a greater importance being attached to the practical and less to the theoretical sides than in the past."

As yet the Defence Department has received no decision on the length of time will be required to attend an active training centre but it will be at least one month the statement said.

POLICE COURT—In the Police Court yesterday the case of a man charged with common assault was withdrawn. A drunk and incapable was fined \$3 and costs or 5 days. Three other drunks each failed to appear and had their \$5 bail bond forfeited.

LITTLE THEATRE GUILD MEETING—The annual meeting of the Little Theatre Guild was held last night at the Charlottetown Hotel. It was decided that the existing slate of officers would continue their terms and that the Guild would devote its time to presenting plays for patriotic purposes throughout the coming season.

MEASLES ONLY COMMUNICABLE DISEASE—Twelve cases of measles were reported in Charlottetown during October. Dr. B. C. Keegan, county medical officer of health said in a review of the month. There were no other cases of communicable disease. No cases were quarantined. In the city during the month there were 60 births, 30 deaths and 16 marriages. In a rapid survey of Queen's Square School 54 pupils were examined.

POLICE MAKE 42 ARRESTS—City police made a total of 42 arrests during October, it was revealed in a report of the month's activities presented to the city council by Chief of Police A. Hutchins. There were four persons arrested under the Prince Edward Island prohibition act for unlawful possession of intoxicating liquors. Three persons were convicted and one dismissed. The Chief said. No fines were collected under the Prohibition Act, he continued. Other fines and costs amounted to \$180. Six transients found lodging in the Police Station over night, the report revealed. The Chief noted with regard to the absence from duty because of illness of Sgt. William McInnis. The Sergeant has 29 years of service to his credit with the Force, the Chief recalled.

INJURED WHEN THROWN FROM WAGON IN ACCIDENT.—Mr. Joseph B. Nolan, 27, is a patient in the City Hospital today suffering from multiple bruises to the head and face and also a badly injured back as the result of an accident on the St. Peter's Road, near the People's cemetery early last evening. It is understood that an Ontario car, which police said was driven by Mrs. Bart Robson, crashed into the rear of a horse-drawn wagon which was driven by the injured man. The wagon was completely smashed, but the horse was not injured. The automobile, which was driving towards the city, was slightly damaged. Mr. Nolan is employed by Mrs. Fred Parkman, of East Royalty, police said.

GOOD PRICES, CATCH SMALL—Island fishermen were receiving good prices for their snail catch, it was learned yesterday from Mr. J. J. Larabee, supervisor of fisheries for the province, but the catch was below average. Quality of the fish was excellent, however, Mr. Larabee said. It was possible the catch might improve this month but there was a considerable drop in October over the same month in 1939. There was no explanation for the scarcity of fish. Apparently there had been no gradual decline over a number of years but a sudden sharp drop this season. The price to the fishermen averaged about seven cents per pound, the supervisor said. The bulk of the catch is shipped to American markets.

TO BE TRANSFERRED TO SUMMERSIDE.—Two platoons of the Veterans' Guard of Canada, at present stationed at Charlottetown, will be sent to Summerside as soon as suitable accommodations are found for billeting them. It has been decided to present the units, which consist of four platoons with a nominal roll of 170 men. About 80 of these will go to the Western Capital where they will be billeted. The remainder will be billeted at Summerside. Mr. J. H. Dwyer, Commanding Officer, said last night. Yesterday afternoon Capt. Underhill, commander of Major Dwyer, paraded from their training camp at the Ordnance Compound to the gridiron at St. Dunstan's University where they will attend a concert at St. Peter's church. OTTAWA, Nov. 18—(CP)—Instead of making democracy effective as far as the workers are concerned, everything possible is being done for the protection of those exploiting the workers, Clarence Gillis (COP Cape Breton South) charged today in the House of Commons. There was serious danger in the government allowing development among the people of an attitude that there was nothing to fight for, he warned. It was not enough to ask the people of Canada to fight for the restoration of the old world. He cited specifically several instances of what he termed "Hitler tactics" by employers.

Police Probe Distribution Of Pamphlets

Members of the City Police and Royal Canadian Mounted Police are busy at present investigating the distribution of subversive literature in Charlottetown. Police said hundreds of pamphlets containing such material were delivered at the doors of citizens on Frontal, Sydney and other streets under the cover of darkness early last Saturday night or early Sunday morning. The literature was left on doorsteps, in latches and other places where they would be easily found by householders. Police added they believed the pamphlets were distributed by Jehovah's Witnesses, an organization which had been outlawed by Order in Council early last summer pursuant to the provisions of regulation 39C of the Defence of Canada Regulations. The investigation was conducted yesterday by Constable C. W. McArthur of the R.C.M.P. and Constable A. J. Lund of the City Police.
