At a meeting of the representatives of the different Island Boards of Trade in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon the following resolution was passed unanimously:

Whereas at a meeting of representatives from the Boards of Trade of Charlottetown, Summerside, Souris, Georgetown and Montague, held yesterday in the Board of Trade Room, it was unanimously decided that in order to meet the requirements of this Province in regard to the winter mail service, it is absolutely necessary that a special train shall at all times run in connection with the winter mail steamer;

Therefore Resolved that we demand as a matter of simple justice that hereafter a special train shall be run in connection with the winter mail steamer, and that a date be fixed early in December, say the 1st, when the steamer shall go into commission, but that the mail train be continued from year to year without interruption. Carried unanimously.
