THE MARKET.—There was a very small market in Charlottetown yesterday. Eggs sold at twenty and twenty-two cents per dozen and butter at thirty and thirty-two cents per pound. There was a considerable quantity of fresh herring for sale.

GOOD WORK.—In the Agricultural Gazette for last month it is reported that the "Frederickton (P. E. I.) Farmers' Institute is doing good work. Since the year started twenty new members have joined. A pure-bred Chester white boar has been purchased for the use of the members. A pure-bred Shorthorn bull is being arranged for, and the members are discussing the purchase of a grain and small seed separator. Co-operative buying of tested seeds is another feature of its work."

POLICE COURT.—At the police court in Charlottetown, yesterday, two men, Wm. McCallum and John Larter appeared on the charge of corner loading were each fined \$2 or five days. More summonses for this offence are to be issued, as corner loading is altogether too prevalent in Charlottetown. Henry Wash and W. Bennett for being drunk and disorderly were each fined \$20 or sixty days. The case of John Flynn for vagrancy was dismissed.

FARMERS MEETING.—On Tuesday May 5th Mr. W. Davidson B. S. A. Instructor in Field Husbandry gave an address before the Mill View Farmers Institute on "The Grading and Production of Seed Grain." The subject was handled both from the standpoint of producing pure seed by hand selection and that of grading seed for immediate sowing. Mr. Davidson outlined the methods adopted by the Canadian Seed Growers Association and in this connection urged the members of his audience to join that Association, pointing out the advantages to be gained by so doing. He also spoke of the Field Grain Competitions and expressed the hope that a number of entries would come from that section during the coming summer. There was a large and attentive audience present, notwithstanding the bad state of the roads.

The Rexall Girl, 2.13, was placed in Mr. Hammond Kelly's hands yesterday. Hammond will train and race her in her season's engagements. This daughter of Bingen, 2.06, should be one of the best racing prospects' this season.

Bottom, 2.34, the handsome son of Bingham, and Mayor Todd, splendid son of Todd, were each given some "brushes" by their owners yesterday. Both are extremely handsome trotters.

During the past ten days ten foals, sired by Bottom, have been born in various parts of the country. They are considered by competent judges to be exceptionally fine stock; the kind that will be most desirable for the future. Handsome, robust and full of vitality.

"OUR MOTHERS"

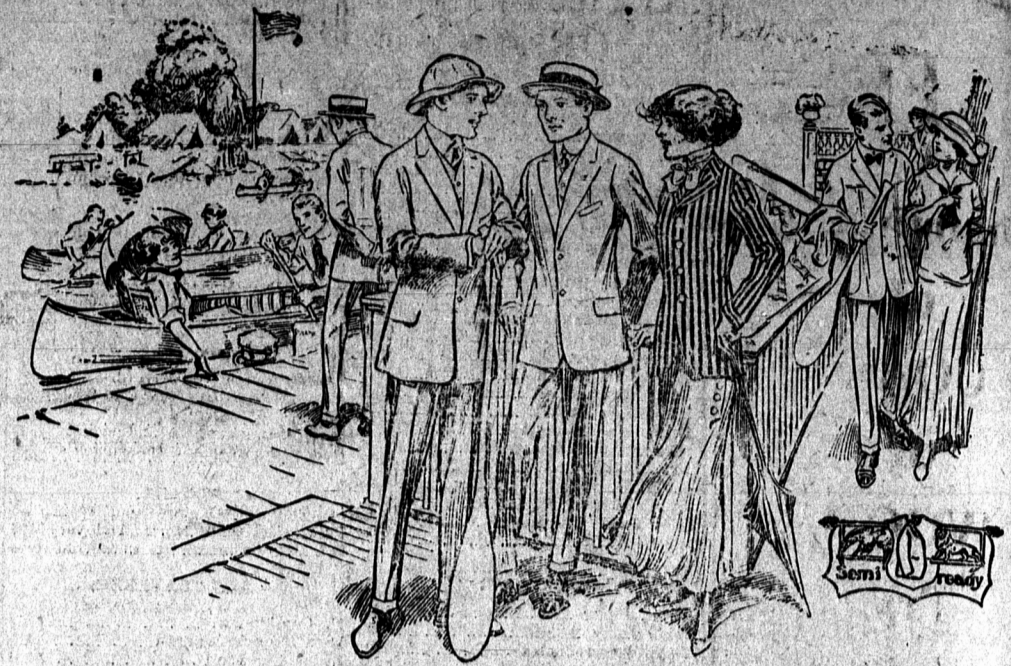
A toast given by Randall Foster (15 years old), at a Mothers and Sons Banquet. It is a suggestion for "Mother's Day" observance May 10th.
