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BLACK HAWKS RALLY TO DEFEAT LEAFS 2-1

Record Crowd Of 18,000 Sees "Cinderella" Team Take Lead In Cup Series

CHICAGO, April 10—(CP)—The "Cinderella" boys of hockey, Chicago Black Hawks fought from behind again tonight to beat the favored Toronto Maple Leafs 2-1 in the third game of the Stanley Cup final before a record National League crowd of 18,497.

Victory in the viciously-fought game gave Hawks, at full strength for the first time in the series, a 2-1 edge in games and left them needing only one more win to take the cup. The fourth clash will be here Tuesday night.

Doc Romnes, playing in a football helmet with a guard for his broken nose, won the game late in the third period when he blasted a low, hard drive past goater Walter Broda from 30 feet. Leafs roared a futile protest that the puck struck the post and did not go in the net.

Reversal Of Form
Hawks won on a surprising reversal of form from last Thursday night when they had rookie Paul Goodman in goal and took a 5-1 beating from the National League champions. Return of Mike Karakas and right wing Mush March gave them renewed confidence. They won the first game 3-1.

Leafs took the lead in the second minute of a wild first period in which eight minor penalties and a major were handed out. Syl Apps fired the goal while Romnes and March were in the penalty box and from then on it was an uphill fight for Hawks, who won the last play off slot in the league's American section.

Over-anxious in the first period, Romnes and March were unable to take advantage of a two-man edge while Leafs served successive penalties over a four-minute stretch.

Match Leaf Pace
But they steadied in the second and had an edge in the latter half of the period.
Carl Voss tied the game at 16:02, pushing the puck past Broda from close-in after a face off by the Toronto cage.

The game almost got out of hand in the first period as Leafs met high stick with high stick. Twice the delayed-penalty rule had to be enforced when a Leaf was penalized with two others off at the same time. George Parsons drew the major for punching Rogers Jenkins.

There were only three penalties in the second period and none in the third. Hawks kept up the offensive after tying the score, unafraid to leave only one man back to protect goater Karakas. Their tight checking deep into Leaf territory prevented all but the occasional breakaway.

St. Dunstan's Admitted To College Athletic Union

HALIFAX, April 10—Prof. F. L. West of Mount Allison University was elected president of the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union at the annual meeting here Saturday.

A set of Maritime intercollegiate athletic rules for future guidance of colleges staging the annual meet was adopted by representatives of the 10 Maritime universities. Track and field records established last year at Saint John, N. B., and substitution of an 880 yard relay to take the place of the Medley relay now on the track program were also approved.

Application of St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, to the union was accepted. New Brunswick universities represented were Mount Allison University of New Brunswick and St. Thomas; Nova Scotia colleges were Dalhousie, St. Francis Xavier, Acadia, Kings, St. Mary's and Nova Scotia Technical.

Gordon Thompson reported the Rugby Union would cut the entry fee to \$2 per college, but the intercollegiate heads favored a blanket fee of \$10 to cover the entire league. This was rejected by the Rugby Union, and as a result the college teams probably would not join the union.

Schedules for tennis, boxing, hockey, rugby and basketball playoffs were drawn up and approved.

M. E. McLoughlin of St. F. X. was re-elected to his third term as secretary treasurer.
Professor C. H. Mercer of Dalhousie said badminton was growing rapidly in Maritime colleges and he hoped this sport would be included on the regular college athletic program, with a Maritime intercollegiate tournament shortly.

Affiliation with the Maritime Rugby Union was discussed, but most representatives felt there was no benefit to be derived from this as the college winners had forfeited their rights to contest for the Maritime championship in the last few years.

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Providence Reds Hold Game Lead

SYRACUSE, N. Y., April 10—Syracuse Stars, champions of the western division of the International-American Hockey League, tonight defeated Providence Reds 4-3 in overtime in the third game of the best of five series to determine the league championship.

The result left Providence with a one game edge in the series, the eastern division champions having defeated the Stars 2-1 at home last night and 5-4 in Providence Thursday.

All the games of the series so far have gone into overtime play before being decided.

I., April 10—(CP)—A goal by Sammy McManus, former Moncton Hawk, with 57 seconds left to play in the second overtime period, gave Providence Reds a 2-1 victory over Syracuse Stars Saturday night in the second game of their best-of-five game playoff for the International-American Hockey League Title.

Providence forward Duggie Kuhn who starred for "Turo" Bearcats in his amateur days and Jackie Keating, former Saint John Beaver, combined with McManus for the winning marker.

The other two goals were scored in the third period, Jack Markle the league's leading scorer, put the Stars in the lead in the first minute. Six minutes later Mercer tied the count on a fine play with Art Giroux and Willie Starr while Red Hamilton, Providence forward was in the penalty box serving a 10 minute misconduct penalty.

Play through the overtime slowed down considerably as players of both teams were obviously tired. It was the second straight overtime match between the clubs.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

DON'T INCLUDE TOO MUCH
Close-up viewpoint eliminates furniture, surplus details—makes picture include just what you want, nothing more.

WHEN you snap a picture, do you get close enough to your subject?
This is one of the best ways to make your pictures simple and unified. Get close enough to eliminate objects and details that have nothing to do with the picture subject.

Let your subject appear large enough to "dominate" the picture. To make your pictures include just enough, and not too much, use your view finder carefully. Decide what you want to take, point the camera at the chosen subject, and move forward until the image in the view finder shows just the part you want. Then judge the distance carefully, focus accurately, and snap the picture.

Most cameras, including box cameras, allow you to snap pictures when you are as near as six to eight feet to your subject. Some focus for closer distances. And, if you slip a portrait attachment on the camera lens, you can snap pictures at three and one-half feet or nearer.

When you get a picture that happens to include too much, try trimming it until it looks right. There have an enlargement made of the picture as trimmed.

Make it a rule to take pictures near enough to exclude everything that does not help your "picture idea." Soon you will find you are getting better pictures.
