The Turks wounded thirty and captured a British intelligence officer. Reinforcements were sent to the assistance of the Indians while warships kept the Turks off by shelling their positions.

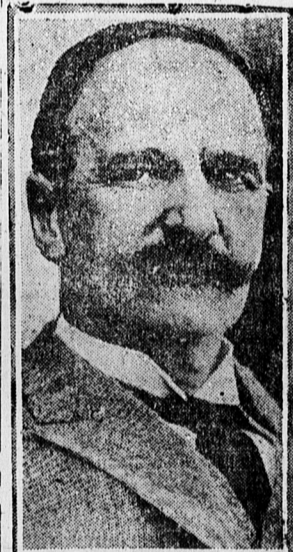
REPUBLICAN CONVENTION CHAIRMAN NOW URGED AS "DARK HORSE" CANDIDATE



Senator Henry C. Lodge

Friends of Senator Henry C. Lodge of Massachusetts, who will be permanent chairman of the Republican National Convention, are urging him as the ideal compromise candidate in case the complex situation at Chicago leads the delegates to demand the elimination of all leading candidates and the acceptance of a man who has not been subjected to the animosities growing out of the convention campaign. Talk of the Massachusetts senator as a "dark horse" comes largely from his New England admirers and the Republican leaders of the Senate.

NATIONAL COMMITTEEMAN FROM DELAWARE WHO MAY BE CHICAGO "DARK HORSE"

General T. Coleman du Pont Republican National Committeeman from Delaware, the state on which the suffragists have been pinning such high hopes for getting the Federal Suffrage amendment ratified, introduced a resolution at a meeting of the national committee in Chicago urging ratification of the amendment by the legislatures of Republican states. It was adopted unanimously. Reports from Chicago indicate the possibility of General du Pont's Delaware friends bringing him out as a "dark horse" candidate at the Chicago convention. He was a candidate before the convention in 1916 and was one of the few who retained some votes on the third and last ballot.

BRITISH WARSHIPS UNDER FOREIGN FLAGS.

Considerable interest attaches to the desire of the Chilean Government to purchase two British battleships and two light cruisers, for in recent years it has been the policy of the Admiralty to carefully avoid the least possibility of any ex-British ship hoisting a foreign flag. Under the present urgent necessity of saving and obtaining money wherever possible tradition is likely to be shelved. Shortly before the war we had an excellent opportunity of making a little money by the sale of a British battleship to the Turks, but they were very anxious to get possession of our Centurion and Barfleur, then being paid off.

But the powers at White Hall considered such a course undignified, and the Turks paid a very high price for two ancient German battleships. One of them was doing a lot of damage to our lines in Gallipoli with her 11-inch guns before a British submarine torpedoed her. In the old days we were not so particular, and at the close of the Napoleonic wars we asked no questions as to the ultimate fate of our surplus warships. Chile bought her independence from Spain with several brigs and corvettes that had once flown the British flag. In the fifties we exchanged a frigate for two iron gunboats which the Prussian navy had ordered to be built in England and, some years later we presented them with another. Curiously enough, this latter was employed during the war as a harbor flagship for the battle-cruiser squadron which carried out the raids on our coast towns.

MORE AND BETTER WHEAT.

At no time in the history of Canada has her wheat fields meant so much to the world as now. Canada produces wheat of the finest grades and in such large quantities as to place the Dominion well up among the wheat-producing countries of the world. Both federal and provincial departments of agriculture have done their share in improving wheat varieties and extending the growth of this necessary cereal. An interesting account of the work that has been done is contained in the May number of the Agricultural Gazette, the official organ of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. It is there shown that the most widely grown varieties were

developed by Canadian scientists. Proctor, Stanley, Huron, Bishop, O. A. C. No. 174, Marquis, Ruby and Prelude have each their valuable factors. The history and characteristics of each are given. The Seed Branch and the Department assist the Canadian Seed Growers' Association in extending the growth of pedigreed varieties. The Seed Branch itself encourages seed crop competitions and seed fairs, tests seeds for farmers and merchants, inspects seeds on sale, and has, through the Canadian Seed Purchasing Commission, ensured supplies of dependable seed wheat during recent years.

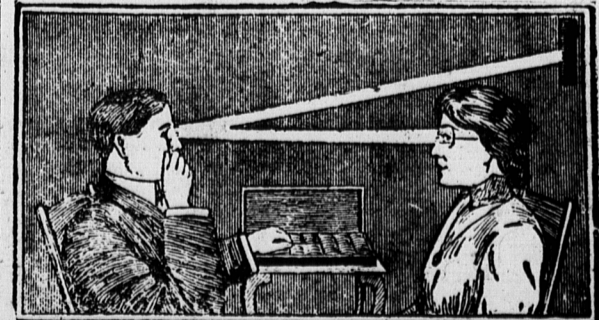

Shamrock IV's Freak Lines as Silhouetted at Launching.



This photograph was taken while the Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton's America's Cup challenger, was being launched in Jacob's ship yard. No wine was wasted as the Irish baronet's racer was fittingly launched six years ago in England. A number of yachting enthusiasts were present to get a glimpse of the craft's freak lines. The above photograph shows them well—her rounded bow, cut off stern and tumble home or inward slope of the top sides of her hull. The mast was stopped the day after the Shamrock IV took the water.
