U. S. S. Missouri In Tokyo Bay For Surrender Scene

MANILA, Aug. 28 (Wednesday) (AP)—Powerful warships of the 3rd Fleet led by Admiral Halsey aboard the 45,000-ton battleship Missouri began a triumphal penetration of Tokyo Bay today as Gen. MacArthur flew north from Manila for his entry into Japan Thursday.

10,000 Faced 60,000 Japs At Hong Kong

CHUNGKING, Aug. 28 (Reuters)—Ten thousand British, Indian and Canadian troops, without an air force, without a navy, faced 60,000 Japanese in the siege of Hong Kong in December, 1941. Maj.-Gen. Michael Mallby, who commanded the garrison, said today upon arrival here with Lt.-Gen. Jonathan Wainwright, hero of Corregidor, and other high American, British and Dutch officials released from Japanese prison camps.

Seed Grain Tribunal Decision Favors Dom.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28 (CP)—The Dominion report of a seed grain tribunal has found that the Dominion Government has the right to set-off money due to Saskatchewan under the War-time Tax Agreement against monies claimed as owing to it by that province under the seed grain loan guarantee. Finance Minister Ilsley announced today.

Extra \$50,000 For Annapolis Valley

HALIFAX, Aug. 28 (CP)—An extra \$50,000 for Annapolis Valley apple growers in returns for their hard-hit 1945 crop was assured today by a decision of the Trade Board statement issued at Ottawa today, but this makes up for only 1-2 per cent of this year's anticipated \$4,000,000 loss in the industry, it was stated in the Valley today.

Seek Settlement Of Ford Dispute

OTTAWA, Aug. 28 (CP)—Labor Minister Mitchell tonight announced he will appoint a conciliation board to deal with a dispute between the Ford Motor Co. of Canada and Windsor, Ont., and the United Automobile Workers (C.I.O.).

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 28 (AP)—Rine Lardner, son of the late humorist, was divorced yesterday by Sylvia S. Lardner. The divorce was granted on the grounds that he became "more or less a visitor in the house" and that his wife ran to "tearful".

Island-Born Engineer Dies At Montreal

MONTREAL, Aug. 28 (CP)—Funeral services will be held tomorrow for George Roderick MacLeod, 72, former assistant chief engineer of the City of Montreal and well-known as a railway engineer with the old Grand Trunk Railway in Montreal and Toronto. He died suddenly at his home here yesterday.

N. B. Man Heads B. C. Law School

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28 (CP)—Professor George Curtis, prominent Nova Scotia lawyer and faculty member of Dalhousie University, Halifax, has been appointed dean of the new law school to be opened this fall at the University of British Columbia, the U.B.C. Board of Governors announced last night.

Big Plate Mill At Sydney Closes

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 28 (CP)—The big Dominion-owned plate mill at the steel plant here rolled its last plate yesterday and today workers began dismantling the mill's costly equipment. About 140 men were employed at the mill, but the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation said today they would be absorbed by other plant departments.
