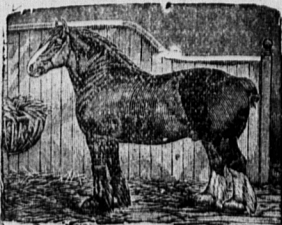

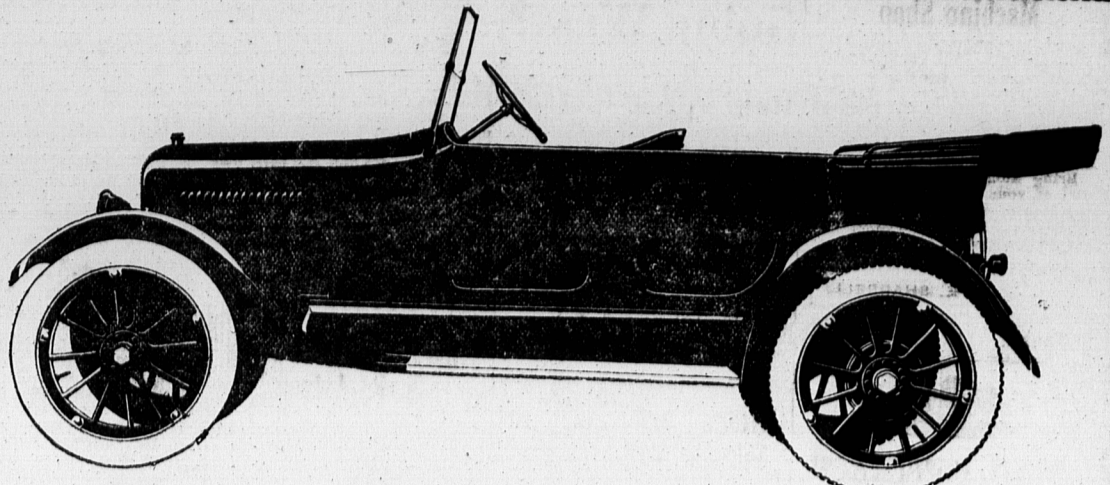

LAYING NEW TACTICS IN IRELAND LONDON, May 19.—The Government's new Irish policy, formulated in recent Downing Street conferences was beginning to be more apparent today. In the future, according to information here no offenders will be jailed on suspicion to be held until evidence is obtained meriting their trial or until it is found they are innocent. Those already in jail will be released unless evidence has been obtained which warrants their being brought to trial. The policy abolishes the plan of procedure against alleged Irish criminals under defence of Realm Act, Normal legal processes will be restored murders and violence will be suppressed with great firmness, it said. Numerous military posts will be established throughout Ireland especially near disorderly centres and south. Flying columns of infantry supported by armored automobiles will be held in readiness to swoop down on suspected terrorist meetings in an effort to catch plotters red handed.
