A FREDERICTON PAPER SAYS:—Henry Braithwaite, the well known professional hunter, has returned from a trip to the Miramichi woods. He reports eleven inches of snow in that region at the present time.

THE statement is frequently made that the falls and winters of half a century ago were much more severe than at present. This has not always been the case as shown by the following quotation of a fall similar to the present one from the Colonial Herald of Nov. 23rd 1838—just fifty-six years from next Thursday. "On Thursday evening the wind came to the north-east when the ground was covered with a thin coating of snow, for the first time this season. There has hitherto been little or no frost so that ploughing has been in no degree retarded, previous to the late fall of snow and we believe was never known to be so far advanced at this season."

THE local civil service examinations have just been concluded before the examiner Ewen Stewart, Secretary of the School Board. It is likely that a smaller percentage of those trying the examinations this year will be successful than in other years. The examination this year is said to be much harder than usual. The reason assigned for the change this year is that the government officials find that too many annually pass the examinations and that many who qualified even according to the examinations were not fit for civil service positions. The idea is to lessen the number of those who qualify by raising the standard of efficiency.

THERE passed peacefully away at Selkirk Station, Lot 42, on the 11th inst. Neil F. McPhee, aged 33 years. Through a long and painful illness, he was never heard to murmur or complain, but bore his sufferings with perfect resignation. The large number who attended the funeral to St. Margaret's Church, on Monday the 13th inst, testified to the high regard in which the deceased was held in the community. The funeral services were performed by Rev. Kenneth McPherson, P. P., after which the remains were consigned to their last resting place in St. Margaret's Cemetery. The pall-bearers were Archibald C. McPhee, Alex. McDonald, John V. McDonald, Arch. McCormac, Peter McKinnon and Angus O. McDonald.

SPEAKING OF Harvard's Defeat by Princeton on Saturday, the New York World says: The Harvard football team returned to Cambridge on Sunday morning, gloomy and silent. There was no one on hand to greet them or sympathize with them over their defeat by Pennsylvania and during the day they kept close to their rooms. They are a battered lot, nearly all of them showing bruised faces, as evidence of having come in contact with Penn players. None of them are lame or seemed even to be tired Monday. Grim determination is written on every face and there will be something doing from now on, for the students demand an accounting. The whole university is silent and grim, and as they recover from their days begin to show traces of anger at the result—not at the team, but at what they think must have been dirty work on the part of Penn.

THE home of John and Mrs. McKay, Wood Islands, was the scene of a happy event on the evening of Tuesday, 14th inst, when their daughter Marion Belle, was united in marriage to Peter D. McGregor, formerly of Hopefield, but now of Belle River. The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. A. S. Stewart. The bride was attended by Miss Mary McGregor, sister of the groom, and Rodrick W. McKay assisted the groom. The bride looked charming attired in a dress of white cashmere trimmed with white satin ribbon and overlace. After the conclusion of the ceremony, the guests repaired to the dining table and did ample justice to the rich repast provided for them by Mrs. McKay. The remainder of the evening was pleasantly passed in music, singing and speeches until a late hour, when the guests left for their respective homes well pleased with the evening's entertainment, all expressing the wish that ere long they might enjoy a similar happy time. The happy couple were the recipients of many useful and valuable presents.

At a meeting a few nights ago of the Moncton board of school trustees a suggestion was made that the trustees and other citizens offer prizes for annual distribution in the schools, and several were announced. Chairman Hawke offered a gold medal. Trustees Harris, Bell, Doyle, Flanagan and Bourque also offered prizes for various subjects. The total enrollment in the Moncton schools is now 1,935.

LIEUT. COL. SHARP of the Salvation Army will leave on Saturday for Bermuda, where he will appear before the local house there in support of a bill to allow the Salvation Army Officers to perform marriage. Col. Sharp believes that he will be able to have his wishes in this respect carried out, and it is also believed that before long the army will have their own day schools on the island, as they now have in Newfoundland.—St. John Sun.

INVERNESS, N. S., News: Simon P. Gillis, champion hammer thrower, is visiting at his old home, S. W. Margaree, C. B., before returning to New York. The weather has been so bad of late that Mr. Gillis has given up the idea of having a day of games in Cape Breton this fall. Next summer he intends to return and bring other athletes with him who will hold sports in various parts of Cape Breton Island and in Nova Scotia. [Mr Gillis visited Charlottetown last summer.]

RULERS OF THE WORLD.

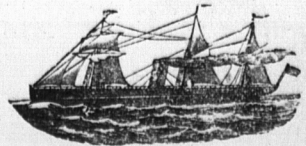
