**THE EGG MARKET.**—The Maritime Merchant says: "Notwithstanding the report of the Government investigator at Ottawa to the effect that there was a large surplus of eggs in Canada, Canadian produce dealers of Montreal made the statement last Friday that there was only fifteen days supply of eggs in the Montreal market. Locally there is a scarcity, but not because of a shortage in supply. There are plenty of eggs in Prince Edward Island, but owing to the extremely cold weather, it has been impossible to have them brought forward. We may look for an improvement in this condition in the course of a very few weeks."

**HENS PAY.**—A gentleman in this city has a flock of 16 Plymouth Rocks which are more than paying for their keep. During the month of December the flock as a starter for the winter's work, contributed two dozen eggs to the family's larder. In January they made an extra effort, and for the month averaged half a dozen eggs a day. Encouraged by their success they went to work in earnest and are now laying an average of a dozen a day, which means a cash contribution of \$5.50 to the weekly revenue. These hens have no special privileges, their house being a somewhat dilapidated one and none too warm, with a more or less restricted yard room in which they make but little use of in the cold weather. They are given a mixed grain feed morning and evening with boiled potatoes and bran mash at noon. A little alfalfa meal occasionally is all the green feed they get. The success of the little flock under the conditions proves very conclusively that any one with a moderately comfortable outhouse and a little yard room could, if they would, supply their own homes at least, and a small corner of the market, with eggs and so add to the world supply of food.

The parish of Kelly's Cross today mourns the passing away from this sphere of one of its oldest and most respected residents in the person of Mr. James Trainor, Sr. of Maplewood in his 83rd year. The deceased always a man of active disposition, intellectually and physically, could be seen on our roads till less than a week ago, as erect and lithe in step, apparently in as good health, as twenty years ago. Saturday last he was doing his bit in keeping the wood cut, but, as it were, keeping up appearances as he was of that manly, independent cast of character, that liked good action and loathed in action, as it savored of sinfulness. On Sunday he was about as usual, but not well enough to go to Church, and complaining of headache. Monday morning, as he was not up at the usual hour, his son went up to his room and found that during the night he had suffered a stroke of paralysis of the brain, and he remained unconscious to the end, about noon of Tuesday, 6th Feb'y. His wife and he had been invited to visit their granddaughter, who was home to see her father, Mr. Peter Francis, Lower Pownal Street, Charlottetown, and as the deceased was not equal to the trip Mrs. Trainor went on Saturday and unfortunately was away from home at the time of his attack, and reached home only half an hour before his death.

Probably much better results would have been secured by a more constant stirring up of the soil, but this class could work only after six o'clock in the evening.
