LIVESTOCK MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, October 7.—Livestock with the heaviest run of cattle to be offered on the two Montreal livestock markets on any one day this year, sales were slow today and prices easier on all lines with the exception of good cattle. Good steers sold up to \$9 with a few sales of choice lots as high as \$9.25 or better. Common light steers sold down to \$6. Butcher cows were selling from \$4 to \$7 and canners from \$3 to \$3.25. Common bulls were steady at \$5 to \$5.25 for the bulk, with a few heavy bulls up to \$5.50.

Lambs good \$9.50 to \$10.50, common \$7.50 to \$9.25. Hog receipts 4613. Hogs were from 75 cents to \$1.00 lower. Sales made at time of writing were around \$12.25 with odd sales up to \$12.50. Sows were not sold.

CAUGHT BY ANCHOR, DROWNED OFF HULL

Frank Doherty Victim of Fishing Accident

HULL, Oct. 6.—Frank Doherty, 70, of 27 Kennerly St., was drowned and his fishing companion, Leonard Reno, 72, of Nantasket Av., Waveland, was rescued when their small fishing dory capsized as they were about to anchor in Hull Bay this afternoon. As the men were throwing over the anchor, the rope caught about Doherty's feet and carried him overboard. The boat capsized, throwing Reno into the water. Doherty was carried to the bottom by the anchor. Reno, who was unable to swim managed to grab hold of the boat and hold on until help arrived, and he was taken ashore.

Edward Hannon and John Flaherty, who were on shore, not far from the scene of the accident, rowed out and took Reno aboard and then dived several times in a futile effort to rescue Doherty.

Fire Chief Henry Stevens and a detail grappled for Doherty's body without success and finally the United States Coast Guard boat from Stony Beach located the body with the heavy grappling irons.

CAPT. J. A. VILLEARD

On Wednesday Sept. 18th, after a lingering illness there passed away at his home in Tignish, the soul of the late Capt. J. A. Villeard at the comparatively early age of sixty-three years.

The deceased who was a son of the late John Villeard of Tignish, was born at Tignish in the year 1866 and while yet a boy showed a great love for literature and travel. At the age of nineteen years we find him serving at Gibraltar in His Majesty's Army where he remained for eight years and won his spurs as Captain in the Imperial Army.

During his army life the deceased travelled much through Europe and the Holy Land and availed himself of every opportunity to see and visit the places of which he had read and dreamed of while yet a youth in Tignish.

In 1894 Capt. Villeard while visiting his parents at Tignish met and married his wife, nee Emma McFadden and shortly afterwards received a military appointment at Charlottetown.

At the outbreak of the Great War, Capt. Villeard despite his years could not resist the call to arms and enlisted in a Canadian expedition, but owing to his health was not allowed to go overseas, as he would wish, but was placed on home duty at Halifax where he remained until 1917 when his health became impaired and he was recommended to Camp Hill Hospital where he remained for two years. In 1919 Capt. Villeard, feeling somewhat improved in health returned with his wife and family to his home town where he spent the remainder of his life among those he knew in childhood and many pleasant evenings were spent at his hospitable home while the genial John related some of his experiences and travels in foreign countries. Mr. Villeard who was widely read and such travelled was a brilliant conversationalist and an ideal host. He had many friends especially among the poor to whom he was a friend and benefactor. During his illness he was visited by his pastor Rev. Dr. MacLellan and Rev. Father McKenna who administered the last Sacraments.
