## Rule Changes In Nat. Hockey Assn.

### Coming Season Will Open November 14th—Forward Pass, One Of New Changes, Also Penalty On Goalie For Holding Puck.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Changes in the rules occupied the entire session of the National Hockey League's semi-annual meeting held here yesterday under the chairmanship of President Frank Calder.

Three changes, which will have a vital bearing in regard to speeding up the game, increasing the scores of goals and helping the offense were adopted by the rules committee.

It was decided to have the 1929-30 season open on November 14th, with Canadiens opening in Ottawa; New York Rangers in Montreal; Chicago in Toronto and Boston in Detroit. The New York Americans will open in Ottawa on the 16th, and Pittsburgh will start their season off in Montreal also on the 16th. The schedule was approved and will be released for publication Oct. 10th.

The revised rules are: The old off-side rule was changed to read as follows: "The ice shall be divided into three sections known as the defending zone, the neutral zone and the attacking zone. It is permitted to pass the puck forward by one player to another of the same side in each of these three zones, but it shall not be permitted to pass the puck by a player from one zone to a player of the same side in any other zone, unless the player taking the pass crosses the zone line behind the puck. The old anti-defence rule was changed as follows: "Not more than three

LANCASTER, Sept. 29.—Miss Helen Hicks of the Inwood Country Club, Long Island, today became the Canadian ladies' open golf champion and won the Duchess of Devonshire gold cup, when she defeated Miss Edith Quier, of Reading, Penn., in the 36 hole final, 7 to 6. Miss Hicks, who is only 18 years of age, is the youngest player to hold the title in twenty-four years that the championship has been held. She is the third United States player to win it.
