ADDITIONS TO FLEET OF NOVA SCOTIA STEEL CO.

SYDNEY, Dec. 9.—The Dominion Coal company has added to its fleet two steamers, the Corunna and Nevada, each with a carrying capacity of 1,400 tons. The steamers are now here and will immediately enter upon the coasting coal trade for the winter months. They were procured from the Canadian Lake and Ocean Navigation company and have been in service on the lakes heretofore. The Corunna will be commanded by Captain J. E. Macdonald and the Nevada by Captain Willett. The Coal company will have twelve steamers in the coastal trade this winter made necessary by their fast increasing trade.
