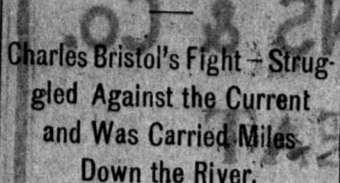

DOUBLE DROWNING IN ST. LAWRENCE

Charles Bristol's Fight - Struggled Against the Current and Was Carried Miles Down the River.

Somewhere in the St. Lawrence are the bodies of two young men who met their death after a fight against wind and waves and slowly descending from a terrible experience in the cold water is Charles Bristol, a youth of 24. The boat are Kingsley Walton, aged 22, and A. A. Blanchard, 23 years, both employees of the office staff of the Dominion Bridge Company.

The three young men have been in the habit of camping on the Heron from Saturday to Monday during the summer months, and last Sunday was their second trip of the year. On Monday morning they all entered a canoe and started for the city, but the wind was high and it was seen that the canoe would not carry them all safely. A heavy rain was falling and the current was swifter than usual. They were driven into the centre of the current and the task of managing the craft became more difficult every moment.

Knowing his swimming abilities, Bristol undertook to leave the canoe for his two friends and jumping out he struck out for Nun's Island, but the current prevented any landing there. Down the river he swam, helped by the swiftly running waters and passing under the Victoria Bridge he tried to get to the guard pier but failed. The rushing waters kept him going until his strength was all but gone. When opposite the Canadian Pacific wharves, men on one of the Harbor Commissioners tug saw him and he was quickly rescued and taken to shore. In an ambulance he was hastened to the General Hospital, and there he lay for two hours before he regained the consciousness just as he was being lifted into the tug.

Bristol's first story was told to Mr. E. S. Mattice, of the Dominion Bridge Company, who was anxious about the fate of the two employees. Mr. Mattice tells the story as Bristol told it to him. The water was exceedingly choppy and coming over the side of the canoe and they did their best for some time to keep it bailed out but they soon realized that it was impossible for it to keep afloat and hold the three of them. Bristol says that as he was the strongest swimmer of the three, he made up his mind to leave the canoe and try and swim to Nun's Island, which that Walton and Blanchard might have a better chance to keep afloat and try to reach some island, which they said they would attempt to do before he parted company with them.

Bristol jumped out of the canoe, and struck out towards Nun's Island. The water was so rough that he lost sight of his friends and the canoe soon after leaving them. He was of the opinion, however, that they would reach land in safety. Bristol says that he tried hard to reach Nun's Island, but the current was too strong for him, and when he realized that he could not make it, he made up his mind to try and reach the guard pier by the Victoria Bridge.

The current again carried him into the middle of the river, and he was so exhausted when he gave up the struggle that he did not have sufficient strength left to try to swim against the current in order to reach the guard pier. He then made up his mind to try to keep afloat as long as he could, in the hope that he would be seen from the shore and assistance sent to him. He did not remember anything else until he was picked up by the crew of the tug. He remembers being lifted out of the water, and the next thing he knew was a nurse bending over him as he lay in bed in the General Hospital.

Young Walton was a stenographer with the Bridge Company and was a resident of Missoucheville, where he lived with his mother. Blanchard was the son of Dr. Blanchard, of Charlottetown, P. E. I. He graduated from the Royal Military College at Kingston and from McGill in 1902. He was engaged in the Engineering department.

Search has been in progress all day for the bodies, but so far without success. Mr. Bristol will be all right in a day or so.

FIREWORKS FOR OLD HOME COMERS' WEEK

A large shipment of fireworks, amounting to four hundred dollars, arrived last night via S.S. "Stanley." This lot of fireworks were ordered by the Tourist Association through Carter & Co., Ltd. A very careful selection was made by the committee, and a program drawn up, which we have no doubt will result in one of the finest fireworks displays ever seen in this city. The display will take place on the water front immediately opposite Fort Edward. The fireworks will be set off from a large barge anchored in the harbor. The display includes some immense 15 and 18 inch shells, which will be fired from heavy iron mortars. These shells are equal, if not larger than those used by Admiral Togo in his last great sea fight, but unlike Togo's shells they will inflict no damage, as they will be fired in the air, and will explode many hundreds of feet above the heads of on-lookers, giving a very elaborate aerial display. The fireworks are being taken charge of by the City Firemen, under the direction of the committee, and the citizens may depend on seeing the program carried out to the fullest. Hitherto, our fireworks displays have been usually carried out on Market Square, but the committee thought best to have the display take place immediately opposite the Park on the water front, so that all can see, and there will be no danger whatever from fires. The citizens can look forward to an evening of rare pleasure on that occasion.
